TRY IT THE THIRD WAY

The son steps to the pencil sharpener and begins to grind away. In mere moments the eight-incher has been reduced to a nub. So he begs for another pencil. No, you say, that's not how it works. Sharpen the pencil enough to use it...then re-sharpen as needed. This isn't rocket science. Yet this little tale is repeated over and over all over. A believer emerges from the waters of baptism and begins to get sharpened. And don't we love to see that! But imagine if this disciple wants to merely sharpen, sharpen, sharpen...without using new knowledge, skills and passion to touch and bless the lives of other folk. So it is with Bible study, Bible study, sermon after sermon after sermon...year after year.

Jesus wants us to be sharp, of course. But the grand commission he gave his disciples was to teach new converts to obey what they were taught. And if he emphasized anything it was that we are to touch and bless people all around us. The Nice Samaritan story is at the heart of Jesus' teaching about what it means to be one of his. Those first guys, the murderous robbers were 'What's Yours is Mine' people. We lock our doors at night because their sort live all around us. The next ones to arrive on the scene hurried to the other side of the road and kept on traveling. These 'What's Mine is Mine' religious types didn't hurt or steal from the victim, but they couldn't be

bothered by a dying man's deep need. Their selfish attitude stinks, even if they were on the way to the Holy City. Finally! A foreigner comes along and springs into action. He is off of his donkey in an instant, cleaning wounds and offering a swallow of water. It is this dear man who represents the person Jesus wants us to emulate. He is the '*What's Mine Is Yours'* model for all who name Jesus as Lord. I call his the Third Way.

One of the many obstacles to being like Jesus and the Samaritan is settling for Sermons, Bible study and study groups etcetera, etcetera. So often it is all lecture...no lab. You know very well that I consider it essential to keep the 'knowing' and 'doing' in balance. I teach that Sunday morning worship is not IT. It is part of IT, for sure. But IT must include intentional, sacrificial service to others. See Matthew 25. I'm hoping that a bunch of Third Way groups will spring up all over the valley...such as the ones already in motion. It is their aim to make somebody's world a better place (many somebodies). At every gathering they remind each other of their purpose...to live out that amazing 'What is Mine is Yours' mandate.

I'm encouraging our church family and even those outside the area to launch such forays into their commu-

SAINTS ALIVE... FIRST SATURDAY OF MARCH




BOOK REVIEWS BY DOYLE CORNWELL

The first book is "Left To Tell", a true account of Immacul'ee Ilibagiza whose family was killed in the



Rwandan Holocaust. It is a look at the extraordinary strength of character of this young lady in unbelievable circumstances. She recounts the struggle to stay alive during the ordeal but most of all how her faith in God saw her through the unspeakable conditions she experienced.

The next one is one of group of many books by the same author, Joel Rosenburg, who is a messianic Jew. The first book is "The Last Jihad" which was written pre 9-11. He was putting the final touches on the book on the morning of September 11, 2001 when his wife called while taking their son to school and asked if he had the television on and when he said he did not she



The second thriller opens with the death of Yasser Arafat and a U.S. diplomat convoy ambushed in Gaza. Two weeks before "The Last Days" was published in hardcover, a U.S. diplomatic convoy was ambushed in Gaza. Thirteen months later, Yasser Arafat was dead. When Joel was asked where he was getting his information, he pointed to




Discovering God midst the Rwandan Holocaust the Bible and especially the book of Ezekiel.

The third book in the Joel Rosenburg books is "The Ezekiel Option" and it centers on a dictator rising in Russia who forms a military alliance with the leaders of Iran, as they pursue nuclear weapons and threaten to wipe Israel off the face of the earth. On the very day it was published in June 2005. Iran elected a new leader who vowed to accelerate the coun-



try's nuclear program and later threatened to "wipe Israel off the map." Six months after it was published, Moscow signed \$1 billion arms deal with Tehran.

The fourth Rosenburg book is "The Copper Scroll" and in 1956 the New York Times broke a story that captured the imagination of the word. Another Dead Sea Scroll had been found, unlike any before it, describing unimaginable treasures worth untold billions in the hills east of Jerusalem and under the holy city itself. This book tells of a fictional search



for the treasures, but uses many scriptural references in the search. It is thrilling and very interesting in light of recent discoveries.

Another little book that I read recently is "The Hope for Immortality" by Ralph Barton Perry. It is "a clarion of hope, a call to courage for those who fear death." In a few hours one can read this book and it does give some good advice.
