It ends with the promise of not ending...if we will but love and embrace this condescending, inviting and stripped down king.






# ROGUE RIDERS TO SLIP INTO CALIFORNIA


# HAND TO HAND EVANGELISM

### **BOOK REVIEW**

So far, we have had some very fine and thoughtful reviews from various members of the congregation. I would like to discuss a few books that may speak particularly to women.

The first is The Power of a Praying Wife by Stormie OMartian. This is an oldie but goodie. Stormie organizes the book by categories of challenges or trial which your husband may need prayer support for. She also deals with the "why do I have to be the one to change" and the "I don't want to pray for him, I want God to smite him" dilemmas [sorry, guys]. For times when words won't come, her prayers and scriptural "power tools" are a great help. Often, praying first, and talking second, brings greater results and rewards and allows the Holy Spirit more latitude to work. This is a deceptively powerful book.

The second book is <u>Chocolate Chili Pepper Love</u> by Becky Freeman. A light and humorous read, it none-theless gives thoughtful insight into the "wild, high-maintenance" marriage: not peaches and cream, but chocolate and chili peppers. It's full of "I've been there" stories and enlightening scriptural annotations.

Lastly, I recommend <u>Made to Crave: Satisfying Your</u> <u>Deepest Desire with God, Not Food</u> by Lysa

Terkeurst. The title is pretty self-explanatory. This is not a diet book, but a book that leads us to an exploration of our relationship with food, God, and trust. It doesn't say what to do, but opens doors to a "want to do." It suggests a way to greater self-acceptance and peace about our bodies and our desire to use them as fully as possible for God.
