It must have been mind-boggling for those early Jewish Christians. A mighty old and revered system had been replaced by a dunk in the water. Priests had been at the center of Jewish life for fifteen centuries. They came from particular families and endured rigorous training prior to serving their first stint in the temple. With the death of Jesus that entire system bit the dust. Although God had been the architect of the building, and the rites that accompanied it, it was all destined to be retired. A new system, streamlined would take its place. Did Martin Luther coin the phrase 'priesthood of all believers'? It is an old doctrine which declares that all disciples of Jesus are priests and ministers. Furthermore, the people of God became his special dwelling, instead of a rock-walled edifice.

Regrettably, the old model of 'some priests and some ordinary folk' persists in many quarters. And so long as we make a distinction between clergy (professionals) and laity (ordinary Christians), we greatly reduce the work force of the church...and disappoint God. The witnesses and ambassadors of Jesus are all converts who have set foot on the Jesus Trail. If some of these followers should head off to a Bible college, the church will

probably be blessed by their new and enhanced skills and deeper understanding of the Word. Our own congregation has been blessed by the formal training of youth and music ministers. Still such folk, including pastors, stand eye to eye with all other believers at the foot of the cross. My point isn't so much to whittle pastors down to size, but to acknowledge the wonderful role which belongs to all believers. We are all ministers. We have yet to fully appreciate this, although we've talked a good game for years.

One example of this is in the area of baptism. Folk are often surprised to hear that any believer can do the baptizing. I recall so well how my dear relative John was the first family member to be baptized one evening when I was visiting the Wallers in Northern Wisconsin. Within mere moments of John being immersed in the river he was assisting me in baptizing his lovely wife, Pam. The two of them, still dripping wet, teamed up to do the same to their fine son, Travis. All three of these newly ordained (baptized) disciples of Jesus placed my Aunt Dorothy, a long time Lutheran, into the watery grave and pulled her back up, 'rising to walk in a new life'. Their own obedience to Christ in this

holy dunking served to commission them to that priesthood of all believers. Some may have thought it all to be quite novel, but to God it is the norm.

Our own congregation recognizes this huge and vital doctrine. I'm not the only one who can preach. We love it when Michael Wing and Gene Stringer man the pulpit so competently. Others delight us with their communion and offering meditations. Mike Royer handles the scripture reading with deftness week after week. And sharing the gospel? Not only are you allowed to tell others of Jesus (and do the baptizing), it is clearly God's expectation for all believers.

Certainly this is not practiced by all churches. Many persist in operating by the two party system (clergy/laity). But make no mistake about this. Before we have towed off a convert, somebody ought to hand her a certificate to be framed and positioned on the wall...A Minister of Jesus Christ. It's not a fad or a neat invention. This has been God's plan from Day One.

God has hopes for us. His only method of winning a lost world to him is people telling people of God's extravagant love, the bloody work of Jesus and a new life where all stand at eye level at the foot of the cross.


PIECE CORPS—

A LETTER FROM TCMII

One of the mission organizations supported by CCA is Training Christians for Ministry International Institute (TCMII). We recently received the following letter from them:

Dear Friends in Ashland,

Her father threw her out. His daughter had become a follower of Jesus. To a Muslim father, this was completely unacceptable. So he threw her out. She was only twelve. So she went to live with her maternal grandmother when told she "no longer had a father."

In Central Asian cultures, this happens. Accepting Christ means you are a traitor to your Muslim culture and heritage. You are an infidel. You have brought dishonor to the family and no longer belong.

I asked her over lunch how she had made her way to Haus Edelweiss. She studied at the university in her country and wanted to serve Jesus somehow. She found out about our partner school in Moldova (almost all the faculty members are TCMII graduates) and studied Social Work there. Then she was able to return to her country to work for a non-governmental organization (NGO) which is legally registered even though it employs many believers. In Moldova, she learned about the opportunity to pursue graduate studies with TCMII.

She then told me her passion. Rescuing young girls

from the streets and sexual slavery. Helping give them an education and teaching them life skills so they can survive on their own without being abused and destroyed by evil people. This is her life. Giving girls who are cast away a safe place to learn and grow.

I was quite interested when she told me why she loved Haus Edelweiss. She remarked that it provided a wonderful place for her to get away and be refreshed while she continued learning things that help her serve our Father better.

As often happens during such conversations at Haus Edelweiss, we begin to talk about what matters most to our Father: that His children are given a safe place to learn and grow. We reflected together about how wonderful it is that he includes us in His work. And when we take care of His children, we feel something of His love and pleasure.



I was showing my niece the church








GUMSHOE AND FOREST REBEL
