So it is with the Bible. Some stories comprise its skeleton. Others are vital organs and limbs. We'll skip the toes. So here is my offer to you. Stay steady in attendance for the remainder of the year, in hopes of getting a clear view of The Story, the plot, of God's dream for humanity...all played out in the lives of colorful characters, some rowdy, others majestic. Sit in the dungeon with Joseph. Stand on the rooftop with King David. Mend your net alongside the likes of Peter and John. Stand at the foot of the cross and gaze into His face. Be astounded by the sound of a 'mighty rushing wind' and the sight of men standing like candles, with flames like fire rising from their heads. Sit in the pew and embark on this exciting journey with me and others.

So along with my ministry to our precious folk I am turned loose on our brothers and sisters in Christ who live in far flung places like Eugene (teaching for Northwest Christian University) and Peru. As this month's newsletter is being folded I should be sitting in the San Francisco Airport, waiting for a plane to Houston. By the time you read these words I will be in northern Peru. Trujillo is called the City of Eternal



Springtime since the temperatures are steadily moderate. My task in Trujillo is to teach on the Biblical Themes and Perspectives of the New Testament. I'll try to provide the gathered Christians with tools for studying, teaching and preaching. Another part of my stay there is that of working with young community leaders and preachers in giving more advanced training. On every trip down I'm asked to teach my Prayer course. If there is time I'll also offer my Helping, Healing, Wonder of Listening. We'll see if that happens. I hope so.

Leaving Trujillo in the north my journey will be back to Lima and on down to the tip of upper tip of Chile. Tacna, Peru, is just a taxi ride from that long, slender country. In Tacna I'll get my first glimpse of granddaughter Mia Jo and the rest of the family... including Karen. I've been invited to teach in the Bible Institute in Tacna. The main topic is Preaching. This has been a new topic for me as an instructor. So I've been reading, studying and preparing lessons. A big task was that of getting much material translated into Spanish. Thanks to Brad and my young friend Yahira for completing this work.

So in a real sense you touch the world in many ways. You are faithful supporters of mission groups all over the globe. And in these treks to South America your influence is felt. I'm overjoyed to be of use to God in this way...and grateful to you for encouraging these forays thousands of miles from home. 
