
He became ageless. All of this backdrop, the trappings of splendid creation, would one day become but dust. But Larry Jones would be forever young. The Pacific Ocean, just a few

We put those checks in an account which is used for special projects that come along...projects we couldn't easily afford otherwise.

They have graduated to Glory but left our church over \$200,000. We have put that money on deposit with the Church Development Fund to help provide money for churches building new facilities. Just the other day we received word that Eva Wagner's estate was settled. Of that estate, we received a check for \$8,500. A check of that same amount was sent to Emmanuel School of Religion. What good news! We are challenged by such generosity. The challenge is to consider how we, too, can make decisions while we are alive which will provide funding for God's work long after we have departed the planet. We thought you'd want to know of the loving-kindness of beloved saints who loved Jesus and this church.

HELP OUR HAITIAN BROTHERS AND SISTERS

The recent earthquakes in Haiti resulted in much damage to our sister churches and Christian schools in that country. IDES

Our church has been recycling for a few years. We have a big recycle cart by the back door. There are

smaller recycle containers inside: Brad's office, the kitchen, and a small tray in the big classroom used by Junior Church.



You can reuse foil pans under flower pots, the big ones are

great for starting seeds. Newspapers are great under messy projects, then toss them into the trash. Plastic jugs, filled with water then frozen are great to put in coolers for outings. Food tubs are good for leftovers or to pass along some goodies.

Ashland Sanitary asks that we "Please empty and rinse all food and beverage containers." This is the list of what we can (and should) recycle: aluminum foil, large metal lids, food and beverage cans, detergent and shampoo containers, milk and juice jugs; water bottles, tubs from yogurt & cottage cheese (not lids), flattened b (cereal, crackers, etc.). Corrugated cardboard, non-foil gift wrap, paper, envelopes, magazines & catalogs, paper egg cartons. Glass bottles must be set aside; they have to be recycled separately.

Once you're used to it, it takes very little time or effort. It's all part of good stewardship
