It has come down to berries... strawberries. Service station attendants and waitresses alike hear my favorite question: 'How'd you like a couple of fabulous strawberries plants? They're free. And I'll even throw in a bag or bucket of my own Black Gold...compost'. At this moment I have a little basket on my dresser, filled with cards and scraps of papers, all with the names and places of business where people have said Yes to my question. Out in the back

yard the blossoming plants are lined up like sissy soldiers. By Mother's Day they will all have been delivered to a new friend who finds the thought of Fall strawberries appealing. And I'll be checking in from time to time to see how the wonder berries are faring.

What will become of these friendships? Heaven knows. What I do know is that I could saved a few tuition dollars years ago and gone straight into horticulture. Sometimes the common interest is canoeing. But it is a bit awkward inviting a cashier or waitress to join me on a canoe trip. This is safe. Plants are delivered to the work place. I never ask for last names. And it is pretty inexpensive. Free plants, thanks be to God. And the compost is simply recycled foot scraps, leaves and other organic material left to decompose. And, hey, it's a ton of fun for me!

I'm wondering how you might devote an interest to God's use? How might your devotion to reading, golf, gardening, music, walking or the like, be used to open doors, lead to friendships, and possibly bear fruit of a spiritual kind?



PERU...DENTAL CLINIC, PASTOR TRAINING AND HIGH COUNTRY INVESTIGATION

Every year I head to Trujillo to participate in Rendezvous in Peru (I helped coin the name). Dozens of people from churches in New Mexico, California, Idaho and Washington (and Oregon!) converge on this city of one million residents. We take on building projects, install chimneys in primitive homes and share the Gospel as we go. Last year my Rotary Club sent along a \$2000 check so I could host a dental clinic. A Rotarian dentist in Trujillo donates his time and, along with a fellow dentist and a host of assistants, is able to provide fluoride treatment, cleanings and fillings. Most of these children have never seen a dentist. What a wonderful gift!

Other than those three days at the clinic, I'll be traveling with John Hendee as we scout out some high country villages for possible future work. Lastly, I'll be teaching those young pastors I've spoken of. They are excited to be in the ministry but have little opportunity for ongoing education and training. My missionary friends have asked me to travel there at least once a year for several days of teaching. I'm grateful to serve a congregation that encourages these forays to distant lands. They are productive for others, but also stimulating and growing experiences for this old preacher too. I'll leave on June 14 and return June 25. Your prayers are coveted. Jim L.

The most amazing and comforting part of all, though, is that he/she knows the stuff that might get you thrown in jail if it were ever made public. When I say amazing and comforting what I mean is that your friend loves you and continues to think you're terrific anyway.

As my friend and I parted ways this morning I got to thinking about how I pray for my friends. Now I know this may sound like no-brainer stuff to some of you, but really. . . I tend to take those I love for granted at times. It's easier to feel "spiritual" when I think I'm investing myself in something "hard"

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like being kind to someone who rubs me the wrong way---an "enemy" (putting a loose construction on the definition, of course) like Jesus talked about in one of his famous teachings. Some of you will recognize the following verses from attendance at the last prayer retreat, but I think that for me they make an excellent refresher course in how I pray for some really great folks in my life. For that matter, it wouldn't be a bad idea to pray consistently this way for those around us, period. The reference is Colossians 1: 9-12:

"... We have not ceased praying for you and asking that you may be filled with the knowledge of God's will in all spiritual wisdom and understanding, so that you may lead lives worthy of the Lord, fully pleasing to him, as you bear fruit in every good work and as you grow in the knowledge of God. May you be made strong with all the strength that comes from his glorious power, and may you be prepared to endure everything with patience, while joyfully giving thanks to the Father, who has enabled you to share in the inheritance of the saints in the light."

Are you—am I --- catching this? I want my friends to know God's will. I want them to grow to their maximum potential so that their "walk matches the talk". I want them to have strength and to be prepared when the waves swamp the boat in this ocean we call life. More than anything I want them to be blessed with joy, because I am blessed with the joy of having them as part of my inheritance, and they me.

So let's keep on praying, folks. We not only need one another but we are each a treasure chest worthy to be "unlocked" and enriched by one another in this wonderful ongoing process we call friendship.


