"...one of the elders said, Do not weep! See the Lion of the tribe of Judah...then I saw a Lamb" Revelation 5:5

Watch him grow up and you see a lot of this lamb. He is shorn and keeps quiet. He is slain without so much as a bleat

But don't be fooled. Inside that baby is a man who can preach sermons to pierce the heart and wilt the spirits of darkness.

He is gentle and he is fierce. He is meek and he is mighty. He can take a beating, but with a mighty hand he will cast the wicked into eternal fire. He is a Lamb and, indeed, a roaring Lion. He will outgrow the crib of his infancy and leave home at 30. It's then that we need to encounter him again. Listen to this man preach; hear him out.



BUDGET PRESENTATION AND AF-FIRMATION OPPORTUNITY





A big thank you to all who participated in Operation Christmas Child this year. Last Sunday November 21 following the morning


