Lori Jo taught me much about talkatalka. She said that while many missionaries speak with their mouths she was intent on talking with her hands. So she went off to Iraq and spearheaded the construction of a 10,000 square foot women's center. She and Brian have done the same sort of 'talking hands' stuff in Tacna, Peru. As I write this they are in Africa checking out a medical mission with the possibility of moving and serving there after their nursing internship. What drew them to look into that nation is the glaring shortage of medical care for the people of Sierra Leone. In a world




which seems to first consider retirement plans and personal benefits their criteria for working seems to be quiet odd.

Some time back Lori had that talkatalka conversation with me. I looked at my own ministry and realized I was mainly a talker. And there is a place for verbal communication, for sure. Yet it was while serving the homeless in Lithia Park that I felt clearly on the Jesus Trail. People could be critical and call our labors 'enabling'. But I didn't see many Christians getting their hands dirty in serving the poor. Now that I'm working with the fledgling cadre of believers in Klamath Falls (and not feeding the poor) I feel like I'm back to words and more words. We can point fingers at hitchhikers, panhandlers and free-loaders. But the question still nags us...so what <u>are</u> we doing to make somebody's world a better place.

I developed BuddyTime as a tool for enlisting Christians and non-Christians alike in community service. It is working for groups around the West. It combines Camaraderie, Character Conversations and Compassionate Action. Relationships, personal growth and loving kindness. Sounds a bit like the lifestyle of Jesus. Of course we want to get people ready for Heaven, but along the way we need to make somebody's world a better place in the here and now. Can we talk (there we

go again) about this, friends?
