A IOUV DISCONTENIES

Maybe you have sensed my discontent with 'church as usual'. It has been building for years. Maybe you have experienced something similar as well. When I was out of the ministry for one year the components of this unhappiness with church came into focus. For the first time in nearly four decades I saw church from the pew. I had enjoyed the ministry...preparing messages, spending most of my time with very fine Christian people like you. But from the pew it was quite boring. The plan seemed to run something like this...Let's meet at the church on Sunday morning to sing songs which may or may not verbalize what you'd like to sing to God. Then sit down and listen to the main man talk for thirty to forty minutes. And come back next week for more of the same. Actually the sermons I heard in those pew days were pretty good. But I kept asking... how have people put up with this from me. I didn't like it. It was too easy. So I repented. I vowed to never return to that model of church.

Sometimes people are bothered that I include so many people in the sermon time. If you cut your church teeth on those monologue messages I can see how you'd be bugged by people interrupting and raising their hand to interfere with my talking. Personally I am delighted to interact with the congre-

gation. I tell folk that our whole church preaches on Sundays. I write the message a week ahead of time and send it to David Bruce. He adds all of those great backgrounds and puts it in a PowerPoint format. He sends it back so Brad and I can tweak the slideshow a bit. Music is added. Then Sunday arrives. At 10:45 we preach it..all of us.

Furthermore, Sunday morning is the not the end all, be all. It is not The Game. It is Half Time. The plan is not just "Y'all come back next week". The plan is to get out there in the trenches and live the sermon we shared in the hour before noon on Sunday. I hope I'm serving as a good role


I've moved the date of the Yard Sale to Saturday, August 23...9-3. The location is still being deter-
