Residents help flood victims

Kind-hearted Cuckfield residents have rallied round to send supplies to flood victims in South London.

The villagers sprang into action after local mum Sarah Robinson appealed for help though the Holy Trinity School PTA and the cuckfield.org Facebook page.

Moved by the plight of those having to abandon their homes following the floods, Sarah made contact with people living in the affected areas to ask how she could help. "I found out that I could take donations to the Salvation Army Hall in Addlestone, where they would be distributed to flood victims and to the volunteers assisting with the clean-up," said Sarah. "I started asking friends and neighbours for donations of food and within a couple of days I had people knocking on my door dropping off supplies."

They included donations of cakes from Elvira's café at Borde Hill and The Bay Tree in Haywards Heath, gallons of soup made by Naya Stevenson, home-made quiches and dozens of tins of food. "I also collected donations from a PTA cake sale held the night before," said Sarah.

"My car boot was completely full and there was hardly any room on the back seat for my children!"

On arrival at each drop off, Sarah was given a warm welcome. "They were pleased and touched that other people were thinking of them and wanted to help. We moved on to deliver to Chertsey and my daughter Kate handed a big slab of flapjack to a group of firemen who were having a coffee break, which went down really well.

"My son Jack had to wait for a bride and groom to emerge from the church in Chertsey before he could take in the home-made soup to volunteers in the adjacent church hall. Lines of volunteers passing sandbags along a human chain is not exactly what you expect in your wedding photos but the newly married couple seemed unperturbed!"

Sarah is planning to return to the flood hit area with more supplies but this time will be collecting cleaning products and other practical items rather than food. To find out how you can help, watch out for details on Cuckfield.org website and facebook page.

WWI Regimental talk

More than 120 people gathered at Holy Trinity Church last month to hear Cuckfield Museum's first talk of the year. Matthew Jones, Assistant County Archivist at the West Sussex Record Office in Chichester, came to talk about the Royal Sussex Regiment during WW1, using regimental records held at the Office. Veterans from all over Sussex, members of the British Legion and many village families who had links with the regiment attended.

Using photographs, letters, posters, diaries and official records, Matthew told the story of the 'pals' battalions, made up of volunteers who were almost entirely from Sussex, known as 'Lowther's Lambs' because their regimental mascot was a Southdown sheep. League tables were published in towns and villages to encourage recruitment and by the end of 1914 over 3,600 men had come forward. Company Sgt. Major Nelson Victor Carter, an Eastbourne man of the 12th Btn, was killed and awarded the Victoria Cross. Members of the audience were shown the letter to his widow from his commanding officer – written with great kindness and sympathy.

Now is the perfect time to get in training for this year's Easter Monday Walking Race.

The race, which starts at 10am on 21st April, will see villagers battle to get their hands on one of several impressive trophies and medals.

Entrants will follow a five mile route around the perimeter of the village, many of them adding to the fun by wearing fancy dress. Last year's race saw fairies with wands, medieval wenches, bunny ears and lots of bow ties.

While the walkers are on their way, children are invited to search for the hidden foil-covered tickets which will win them an Easter egg.

Organised by the Independent State of Cuckfield, the annual walking race started out in 1927 as a 'challenge' between E.Jard and F.Hoadley, walking to Bolney and back, 'fully' dressed (collar and tie). The event has been

held each year since, except for the odd break including during WWII.

There have been several different routes but the current circular course, starting at Cuckfield Rec and taking in Ansty, Deaks Lane and Whitemans Green before finishing back at the Rec, has been used since the Independent State of Cuckfield started organising the event in the 1960s.

Some older residents can remember prizes such as a roasting joint, sack of coal or cartload of manure being awarded but these have been replaced by cups and medals for the various individual and team categories.

The event is open to all aged over 16 years but only Cuckfield Residents can win any of the individual cups. Teams can be entered by any Cuckfield club, society or institution with the total of the fastest 3 times counting.

Entry costs just £2 and registration starts at 9.15am.



Photographing Early-purple Orchids




CHANGES AFOOT

Parish Clerk retiring after 22 Years of service

Frances Jones, the Clerk at Cuckfield Parish Council for the past 22 years, is retiring at the end of March this year and moving on to pastures new. Frances and her husband Dave will be heading off for 6 months in their camper van to explore the charms of Northern Europe – and well-deserved too!

Frances' knowledge and expertise has been an invaluable asset not only to Cuckfield Parish Council but Clerks from over the county have regularly sought out

her views on a whole range of issues. We will miss her and we wish her well in her travels.



The Council will also be taking on a new member of staff. Jane Forester will be joining us at the beginning of March as the new Clerical Assistant. Jane will be the main point of contact for bookings for the Hall.





Office opening hours

Please note that during this transition the office opening hours will alter slightly. We will still be open 10am to 4pm Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays but for the next few months the office will not be open on a Tuesday morning. This will only be a temporary arrangement and we will endeavour to restore normal hours as soon as we can.

Shared Ownership Housing at Mantell Park/Bylanes Close

Also known as 'part buy/part rent', this government supported initiative helps you to get a foot on the property ladder and work your way up to 100% ownership. You buy a percentage share in a brand new home and pay a subsidised rent on the remaining share.

At a later stage, you can increase the share that you own in your home. This is called ëstaircasingí. It is a good idea to make plans for staircasing when you first buy your shared ownership home. You can either staircase all the way to 100% ownership in one go, or in three stages. The more shares you buy, the less rent you pay. Talk to your independent mortgage advisor about your

intentions and talk to Moat Housing to find out more about how it works.

In line with government priorities, Ministry of Defence personnel and housing association or council tenants will be awarded top priority for allocating these homes. People who live or work in the local area will also receive priority.

The Youth Centre – London Lane

As you may be aware, West Sussex County Council is planning to sell the Youth Club/Playgroup building on London Lane. Used by both the Playgroup to provide care and education to the very young of our village and surrounding areas, and Orchard House who care for children and young adults with severe learning difficulties, and other youth groups, 85% of respondents to our Neighbourhood Plan consultation felt that this building should continue to offer these very important services. With this in mind, the Parish Council has registered the building as a Community Asset, which means we have six months to put forward a bid for the property. The Council must now use this time to consider how to raise the necessary funds. Taking out a loan is the most likely possibility to enable us to achieve the asking price of £200,000 to purchase the building. Fortuitously, if this course of action is agreed by councillors, it will not have any impact on the Council Tax as the last payment for the current loan taken out to refurbish the Queen's Hall comes to an end in the summer. However, the costs of maintaining the current building are high and it is probable that a new building will be required in the future in order to provide the village with a long-term, viable asset. If we are successful in our bid, you will be hearing much more of our plans in the years to come!

Parish Council vacancy

We are sorry that Giles Darling has decided to resign as a councillor. We thank him for his assistance over the past few years and wish him well with his endeavours with the Post Office. This leaves a vacancy on the Council and, if you would be interested in working for your community in a very varied role, do please contact either the office or one of the councillors for more information.

Roads and traffic update

Progress with the proposed new zebra crossings at Ardingly Road is extremely disappointing. Having agreed with West Sussex County Council that the Parish Council would take over management of this scheme, we had hoped to speed up the whole process. However, the amount of 'red tape' through which we have had to wade has been greater than anticipated and it looks as though it will be the summer holidays 2014 before the crossings will be installed. It is also intended that the work on the new signage/road markings at Whitemans Green will be carried out at the same time.

Progress is also being made on the other schemes. Plans for a new puffin crossing in London Road have been agreed and this is scheduled for action by the County Council in 2014-15. The plans for the build-outs in London Lane are still in the programme and will be implemented as soon as sufficient funds are available. The scheme to improve the bus stops and parking along Broad Street is to be carried out by the County Council in the 2015-16 programme and there is also a longer term scheme to improve road safety at the Whitemans Green roundabout. The pavement along the High Street running north from the Queen's Hall is a real cause for concern. The County Council will be undertaking repairs and there is an ongoing conversation as to what the best course of action is to protect the pavement for the long-term.

We will continue to work hard, with the help of County Councillor Pete Bradbury, to ensure that these projects progress.

Mussels in cider and cream

Serves 4

Mussels are a great sustainable fish dish. They are cheap, plentiful and very tasty and can be bought at the Fresh Fish Shop in Haywards Heath. Wobblegate Cider is available at their Farm Shop in Bolney.

For this dish you will need a large pan with a well-fitting lid. Make sure the mussels are all closed before cooking and discard any that do not open when cooked or have broken shells.

Ingredients

2 medium onions, diced

3 sticks celery, diced

1 clove of garlic, grated

2kg mussels, rope-grown, de-bearded and cleaned

1x 500ml bottle Wobblegate medium cider

200ml organic double cream

A handful of greens (Chard/Kale/Spinach or Parsley), washed and shredded

A large rustic bread (focaccia or ciabatta) Lemon wedges

As this is my last piece for Cuckfield Life I wanted to take the opportunity to share with you a few of the wonderful places, people and produce I have discovered during my time here. We are incredibly fortunate to have some truly superb producers close by and this month's recipes showcase some favourites. Toos and Beja at Laines produce top quality vegetables year round with the added benefit of zero food miles, optimum nutritional value and seasonal freshness using techniques that honour and support the local ecosystem. You can buy direct from the farm shop or at the monthly food market in the village. Down the A272 in Bolney, Wobblegate press refreshing apple juices and ciders, plus they have a farm shop where you can taste different varieties. The cheese featured in the Gratin recipe is produced in Horsted Keynes from The High Weald Dairy and can be bought at Wealden stores and the very fabulous Grape and Grain in Haywards Heath. They produce a range including organic hard cheeses, as well as goat and sheep's cheese. With food this good available on the doorstep, eating locally sourced ingredients feels deliciously effortless. Bon apetit!

Method

- Start by sweating the onions and celery in a little oil until translucent and soft.
- 2. Add the garlic and turn the heat up.
- After the pan is good and hot, add the mussels and a good glug of cider, pop the lid on straight away to keep all the steam in the pan to cook the mussels as fast as possible.
- 4. After a minute give the pan a shake.
- 5. Leave for another two minutes, then check the contents.
- 6. Turn the heat down and drop in enough cream to create a velvety sauce.

- 7. Stir in the greens and season to taste.
- 8. Serve with chunks of bread, salty butter and wedges of lemon.

In 1982 when Cuckfield dad Peter Cheesmur couldn't find a football club for his two sons to join, there was only one thing to do – set up his own.

Over 30 years later the club, Cuckfield Cosmos, has grown beyond Peter's wildest dreams to become one of the biggest and most thriving youth football organisations in Sussex, providing weekly games and training for more than 375 youngsters.

It's a far cry from the days when Peter started coaching a group of five boys on the recreation ground. "My sons wanted to play football but there were no junior teams in the village," he recalled. "They tried the local rugby club but that didn't suit them. I'd always enjoyed football, so I decided to organise a weekly kick around at the local playing fields. Three weeks later I had 25 boys enough to start a team!"

As the club continued to grow there was a need for further coaches and trainers, so local dads Graham Roope and John Rolling joined, along with Tony Constable and Derek Rendall.

But Peter soon found out that recruiting players and coaches was the easy bit! "The biggest challenge was finding somewhere to play," he said. But once again Peter used his initiative and approached the village youth club, which gave permission for use of the adjoining field in return for becoming a committee member!

The next hurdle was acquiring goalposts. "We had no funds but fortunately I had a friend, Paul Smyth, who owned KPS, who offered to make some for us," said Peter. "Another Cuckfield resident, Bob Gibson, who had five sons, donated 30 footballs and we were on our way!"

The club was originally called Cuckfield Youth and Minor Football Club and the first games were played against local schools. "We played friendlies with mixed

age groups and mixed sexes," said Peter. "In fact one of our better players was a qirl – Charlotte Roope."

At that time, players paid subs of just 10p a week but luckily villagers were on hand to help raise extra funds. "Kate and Les Fleming gave us a huge Easter egg which was raffled in the King's Head pub and raised £30. That was our first fundraising event!" said Peter. "After that the support from the village was fantastic!"

"During this period Bruce Spencer and Pat Gallagher, who were organising summer six a side tournaments for young people, joined with us to increase footballing opportunities for the older village children."

By 1987 Cuckfield Youth and Minors became a 'proper club' having already formed its own constitution and committee. The team was renamed Cuckfield Cosmos and the first president was village stalwart Phyl Bowring, who held the role until her death four years ago. They also adopted the club colours – yellow and black.

At this time training on Saturdays and league matches on Sundays seemed to take over every green space in Cuckfield, including Warden Park School which supported Cosmos with the use of its facilities.

Throughout the years the club has been supported by a strong band of fundraisers and taken part in events such as the Lord Mayor's Procession, where on one occasion teams paraded around the village in an opentop double decker bus, and the Cuckoo Fayre, where the players demonstrated their skills in the centre arena. They held jumble sales, fathers' matches, sponsored walks and many other events in order to raise money to support the club.

Over the years the club has gone from strength to strength to become one of the biggest clubs in the junior league. Last season saw Cuckfield Cosmos teams playing in six out of the seven youth cup finals.

"We now have 375 young footballers playing in 23







teams in the league," said current Chairman Peter Trump. "We also have players in 3 age groups not yet formulated into teams, along with 3 or 4 potential girls' teams."

The club has also welcomed second generations of players. "One of my proudest moments was seeing my grandson Josh run on to the training field in Cosmos colours," said Peter Cheesmur.

But, despite its rapid success, the club has never lost sight of its original goal – to give young people in the village an opportunity to play football. "Our ethos is to provide football in a safe environment for all levels and experience. We will never turn anyone away," said Peter Trump. He explained: "It's not just about football. It's about the wider community and being part of the football team as growth into the community. And we always encourage the whole family to get involved."

"We are never short of youngsters wanting to play but our biggest problem is recruiting coaches," he added. "We can only manage a certain number of boys and girls and unfortunately some of our senior teams have waiting lists. Lots of dads turn up to help and run the line but sadly can't make the commitment to running a team."

One way to tackle the problem is to provide home grown coaches. "We provide opportunities for parents to become coaches and are encouraging some of our older players to referee junior matches," said Peter. "We recently recruited a specialist goalkeeper trainer who will work with all age groups, which is really exciting."

Over the years Cosmos has become known in local football circles as a good place to scout for talented young players and, as a result, many have gone on to join academies at Crawley and Brighton – the most famous being Dean Cox who went on to become a professional player at Brighton & Hove Albion and Leyton Orient.

Many other players go on to join one of the two

senior football clubs in the village - Cuckfield Town and Cuckfield Rangers. "It would be great to eventually see all three clubs operating under one umbrella," Peter said.

Other opportunities for Cosmos players have included overseas football trips and over the years teams have travelled to Holland, Spain and Germany.

"We've worked with the village's European Association to run exchange trips to our twin town Aumale in France, and we have also arranged matches with teams from Haywards Heath's German twin town," said Peter.

Off the pitch, the club has also been evolving and parents have recently set up a club shop selling new and recycled football kit. Plans are also underway for the club's 30th anniversary celebrations.

Despite its huge success and continued support from the village, Cuckfield Cosmos still has one very big dream to accomplish. "We would dearly love to have a clubhouse of our own," said Peter Trump. "People assume that we own the clubhouse on Whiteman's Green but we just hire that for matches.

"We currently have a sub-committee which is developing a five year plan and exploring the opportunity of getting our own club house, and we are working closely with the Parish Council and its Neighbourhood Plan.

"The new homes being built in and around the village will bring us new families and new players and we will continue to grow," said Peter. "This will hopefully give us the opportunities to push the club forward and maybe find a permanent home. That would be our ultimate goal."

Beyond paint

DESIGN AT HOME



A quick lick of paint will brighten up your living space and lift your mood, but where to start? With so many technical advances in the paint world, is it simply a case of choosing a colour from a growing collection of match pots? Gloss, satin or eggshell for woodwork? Moisture resistant, matt emulsion, vinyl matt or chalky emulsion for the walls? For older buildings how about using something more specialist such as lime wash, for a lovely chalky finish best used on porous lime plaster, or distemper for a soft powdery finish. Nano paints are very clever and can for example insulate, absorb odours, self clean or repel bacteria! To spruce up tired floor boards or concrete, a floor paint could be used. There is so much to consider: Is the paint low odour? What are the VOC levels (volatile organic compounds that will further destroy the earth's atmosphere)? Can you wipe it without removing some of the finish? How robust is it? Is it childproof? Is it water based, so that the brushes can easily be cleaned? I would say that a water based paint is the easiest to work with and would probably be low VOC, a wipeable paint is the easiest to maintain and a chalky paint has the most appeal.

The pigments producing the colour in the paint will catch the light and so will change throughout the day, so it's best to look at paint samples on walls at different times and also in artificial light. Choosing the right tone is only part of the quest as the finish will contribute to set the mood. Chalky emulsions are quieter and softer and teamed up with eggshell on the woodwork are great for older properties. For a brighter look with a real hit of colour use emulsion with a sheen and gloss to bounce the light around the space.

Once you are ready to wield your paintbrush, an easy approach is to unify all interiors with the same neutral background and enhance with colour in accent, and now strong colour is back on trend perhaps it's time to be braver with paint choices. Historical colour palettes helpfully suggest colours for period schemes and these palettes with their strong colours can be used in more modern interiors to add depth and statement. It is also possible to go bespoke and have paint made up to match an accessory or wallpaper in your choice of finish.

Use paint tricks to conceal ugly bumps, heighten or stretch the interior by painting skirting boards and picture rails the same colour as the walls, hide radiators by doing the same. Soften window frames by using the same colour as the wall or frame the view from the window by using a strong colour that stands out against the wall. If you're adventurous, add interest to floor boards by painting on faux rugs or runners on exposed staircases and be creative with the ceiling, especially in a child's bedroom.





It's very common for parents to seek extra tuition for their children struggling with schoolwork and enjoy the satisfaction of seeing them catch up with their peers.

But few imagine that their children could go well beyond that level and develop a thirst for knowledge and the learning skills to reach their full potential.

The Kumon method of learning aims to give youngsters the skills to excel at learning and children in Cuckfield are already reaping the benefits of the international study programme.

"Kumon is not just about helping children who are struggling with maths and English, it's about helping them reach their full potential," said teacher Andy Revell, who runs Kumon sessions in the village. "It's just as beneficial for children who are already excelling and want to stretch themselves further."

The key to success is helping children become self-motivated and confident. "Kumon helps children develop the ability to learn for themselves and not become dependent on others," said Andy. "These independent study skills will be useful in everything they go on to do in the future."

Andy first came into contact with Kumon when his children were pupils at Holy Trinity School. "My son needed extra help in maths, so I enrolled him on the Kumon programme running in Haywards Heath," he said. "My daughter wanted to join her brother and become a whizz at maths! I was impressed at how the bespoke programme was tailored to meet their individual needs and how, from different starting points, they both flourished."

Ten years later, Kumon came back into his life when the local teacher and franchise holder retired. "I was coming to the end of my teaching career and this was the perfect opportunity to work in the village where I was born and to help support local children," he said.

Andy launched Kumon in Cuckfield in January 2013 in the youth club building which had been part of his childhood. "The youth club building was originally two classrooms where children would study woodwork and metalwork, so it seemed appropriate that it should become a classroom again."

Andy runs sessions on Tuesdays and Thursdays and currently has 35 students, aged from 4 to 15 years studying maths, English or both. "Some of the younger students are working on basic pencil skills, while the older advanced ones are heading for GCSE and A Level standard," said Andy.

"What's been most surprising is the diversity of the young people enrolled. We have students from Romania, Bangladesh, the Ukraine and Australia."

Because it's an international programme, Kumon targets are based on the average levels for children all over the world. "It's a sad fact that Britain is lagging behind other countries, particularly in the teaching of maths," said Andy. "It is also common for children to expect to struggle in maths but as their confidence grows they can soon reach the average level for their age and progress much further."

Kumon sessions work on a 'drop-in' basis - children are responsible for collecting their worksheets and progressing through them. Local A Level students are on hand to support the youngsters - timing work, marking papers and listening to children read. "We are also observing posture, pencil work and general motivation," said Andy. "It's a bit like a library where children wander in and work quietly, leaving when they have finished."

Children also take work sheets home with them and are expected to complete around 15 minutes every day. "We ask parents to time the children as they complete each sheet," said Andy. "Once they are able to complete a sheet correctly in a set time, they can move on to the next level. We do, of course, provide parents with the answers!"

Andy will be running a Kumon Open Day at the Youth Club on 5th April from 12.30 to 4pm. The event will include free half hour diagnostic tests for children, which will identify their current level of attainment and areas for further development. Booking is advisable.

Cuckfield Museum reopened last month with a display looking at the effects of the First World War on those living in the village and how Cuckfield could be seen as a microcosm for the country as a whole. The title comes from the book by Alan Miller, on sale in the Museum, which looks at Cuckfield in 1917 using local resources like the Mid Sussex Times of the day.

Parish magazines show the changes in the village month by month. By March 1915, as in many other communities, so many men had volunteered that there was a shortage of labour on the land and parents could apply for labour certificates for their sons to leave school at 12 instead of 14. By April 1916 a creche was being set up to allow women to help with farm work.

Many women who would before have gone straight from home to marriage, now had the chance to train for work. We have photos from the album of Olive Turner, the daughter of a well known family, who became a nurse at the VAD hospital set up in the Queen's Hall, Cuckfield. The photo (above) shows the hall entirely recognisable today but with beds down the side and tables in the centre.

As time went on, the death toll of village men became ever more acute. The parish magazines list the memorial services, which by 1916 were held almost every month for those who had been lost. We have a handbill for a service in 1916 where, between the time of printing and the service itself, two more names have had to be added by hand. We look in particular at Lance Corporal George Botting, a Cuckfield man who was killed in 1917. We have created a tableau around the fireplace

in the Museum, inspired by the scene on one of the postcards sent to George by his wife May.

We have been lucky enough to have been loaned some fascinating objects by local residents. Lin Wood has lent the pocket sized sketch book which her father, Geoffrey Squire, took to war at the age of 19. Already enrolled as an art student and later to become a commercial artist and illustrator, he showed great humour and skilled observation in recording what he saw as a gun team driver with an East London Regiment in the Royal Field Artillery.

Two albums of postcards from Dr Arthur Osborne to his daughters Una and Kathleen show the range and popularity of this brief and simple way of communicating at this time. Cards were of all types - sentimental, factual with views of the devastation in Northern France or wryly humorous. A silver cigarette case was one of the few objects which the family of Pte Archibald Crouch had to remember him by when he was killed in a shell blast on the Somme in Sept 1916. He has no known grave and the case has been loaned by his nephew, Roger Crouch.

The display will remain until June. The Museum is open on Wed and Fri 10-12.30pm and Sat 10-4pm. More information can be found at the website www.cuckfieldmuseum.org

Laura Brook, Conservation Officer at The Sussex Wildlife Trust came to present her 'NATURE STREET' initiative, the inspiration behind our 'NATURE VILLAGE.' The event was fully booked, with enthusiasm, willingness to share and the love of nature the order of the evening.

In gardens, the value of nature's services can be enhanced. Given this winter's endless rain, one of the most topical services is the ability of lawns, garden beds and orchards to slow down flood water run off. Paved patios and front gardens may not appear to matter in your road but the unintended consequences for other areas could be considerable. It's not what you do but the way that you do it. As the Environment Agency works on water flow management, we gardeners can do our bit to make a difference for the future. The bigger picture matters too.

As you may know, we have already begun to map the gardens in Cuckfield that have ponds, flowers for pollinators, bird feeders, insect hotels and so on. Why not let us know what you can see in yours? The Sussex Wildlife Trust is collecting this kind of information and registering date, time and species that will give a picture of wild life in gardens. So far the records have been for species in Nature Reserves but it seems that there could be more biodiversity in urban areas than rural now. Amazing! A unique aerial survey of the gardens in Brighton came up with the estimate that 30% of the area is garden. Is this mapping project new to you? If so, come and have a chat with us at the next Cuckfield Local Food Market on 12th April 9.30am to 12.30pm at The Talbot to find out all about it and how to register what you see.

The last of our Spring Talks is by David Mortimer, author of Sussex Wildlife, about 'How's our wildlife doing around Cuckfield?' It's on 11th April at The Queens Hall 7.45 for 8pm. To make sure of a ticket, buy in advance from Sussex Crafts or Wealden Stores. Then we have our mini workshops around the theme 'If you build it they will come' on 26th April at Holy Trinity School. Grounds Days at the school are a wonderful opportunity for nature lovers to have a look at what the school has done to encourage wildlife and to share with our children the wonderful adventures to be had outdoors. A hidden treasure in the heart of Cuckfield. Why not put this event in your diary now to be sure not to miss a lovely day? Look out for the details around the village and in this column next month.

Orchard House

One of the main beneficiaries of the funds raised during last year's mayoral campaign was Orchard House. Orchard House is a 15-bedded unit which offers care and accommodation for children who have a severe learning disability, normally from the age of 10 to 18, who have been assessed as needing residential placement. The home functions as three units. The long-stay unit is a homely arrangement offering a sitting room, dining room and all the children are able to have single bedrooms. The short-stay unit has a large dining and separate lounge, with a combination of single and double rooms. Finally, the Lodge provides a smaller environment designed to meet the needs of one or two younger people.

The following is a letter from the manager Sue Wadey which explains how the funds from the mayoral campaign will be used.

'As always we thoroughly enjoyed joining in the Mayors Procession. It's lovely to be involved such a positive aspect of village life and our young people really respond to the praise and applause they experience whilst taking part.

Our Amenity fund is used for many of our more ambitious projects, which cannot be funded through usual budgets.

This year we are taking a young man on a special holiday to experience some steam engine journeys. He has a real love of trains and has done the local ones, so staff have made a plan to take him to York for a week where I'm told there are some more impressive railways!

We are also renovating a garden building to accommodate a railway track, as this is an interest for several young people here, and more generally is often something enjoyed by young people who have Autism.

Last year we were able to put a ground level trampoline in the main garden and this has been a huge success – addressing some safety concerns but also making trampolining accessible to more children.

We now also provide services from the Lodge, which used to be part of Court Meadow School, and we would like to put the same style of trampoline in the garden there. When the weather improves your donation will enable us to progress both of these projects.

Thank you so much for both the fun of the procession and your contribution to these resources that will benefit the children all year round.'

It is clear that the support from the Independent State of Cuckfield and the mayoral campaign has been very important to Orchard House and the next project, suggested by the children, is to buy 2 tortoises and a vivarium to house them. For this support to continue we need more candidates to take part in this year's campaign. Local Wedding and Fashion Show


