Let them decide if it is indeed a ringer. If so, they may want to sell. In this case, if your cupboard is a perfect match it is from the Midwest, has the same date of origin, has traces of German influence, is the same size and wood as the one sold, and has boards of the same width.

Q: Value on a Buck Rogers wristwatch that still works? —*Roslyn, Delray Beach, Fla.*
A: I assume you refer to the 1971 Buck Rogers in the 25th Century version with a face that is a re-design of the original Buck Rogers 1935 pocket watch by Ingraham. The box alone lists for \$25 to \$100 (mint) in *Hake's Price Guide to Character Toys*, 6th ed., by Ted Hake (House of Collectibles, \$35). The solo watch books at \$200 to \$800. But a check on eBay shows that ones posted there sold for under \$40.

ATLANTIC CITY NEWS ...

Above All Odds

A Michigan woman had a night out she won't soon forget after winning \$1 million from a \$20 bet while playing Three Card Poker 6 Card Bonus at an Atlantic City casino. According to Online Poker.net, Kathy Wayda was at Caesars Atlantic City playing Three Card Poker when she hit the Diamond Super Royal Flush worth \$1 million, compared to other suits—which would have netted her \$100,000 instead. A recreational gambler, Wayda said prior to her incredible win at Caesars Atlantic City the most she ever recalls having won was \$2,000 while playing a slot machine five years earlier. This time, however, she overcame odds of 20 million to 1 to hit her Royal Flush and win the life-changing sum of money. Amazingly, despite the astronomical odds against making the hand, the week before saw another player walk away \$1 million richer.

Bally's Property Fined

Lack of management supervision of one of its operations in Atlantic City has become costly for Caesars Entertainment Corp., *Gaming Today* has reported. Bally's Atlantic City, one of the Caesars' properties, was fined \$105,000 for

allegedly allowing an underage patron to gamble, allowing self-banned people to gamble, and generally for failing to fully staff the property with security personnel. Also fined was Trump Taj Mahal Casino Resort. The property was fined \$91,236 for failing to shuffle eight decks of cards before using them at a mini-baccarat game. Reportedly, the casino used the un-shuffled cards for three and one-half hours and its surveillance department did not detect that the cards had not been shuffled.

Gaming Going Mobile

California's *Ventura County Star* reports that the New Jersey Legislature has given final approval to a bill that enables casino patrons to use hand-held gambling devices, so long as they are located on casino property. It's another in a series of new gambling options Atlantic City is rolling out in its attempt to compete with casinos nearby. New Jersey is also moving toward offering Internet gambling and sports betting. Casinos would be able to offer electronic versions of games of chance to be played on mobile devices within the casino and adjoining hotel, as well as any outdoor swimming pool area or outdoor recreational area. The player has to first establish an account with the casino, and the bet must be placed, and any winnings paid out, within the casino. The bill requires that the mobile devices be inoperable outside the casino or hotel.



Stand Downs

■ Help for homeless vets

Homeless veterans are frequently at a disadvantage when it comes to getting services and help. Stand Down events are held specifically to assist homeless veterans. While Stand Downs can be held almost year-round, most communities and organizations host events during the summer. If you or someone you know is a homeless veteran in need of any services, now is the time.

Services provided at Stand Downs include assistance with food, shelter, clothing, health screenings and benefits counseling for both VA and Social Security. If a veteran needs referrals for jobs, drug or alcohol abuse or housing, they can find that, too. Events run from one to three days, depending on location.

Many people, volunteers and groups step forward to host the Stand Downs—community homeless agencies, the Department of Veterans Affairs, veterans service organizations—all for one purpose: to help homeless veterans.

If you're homeless (or you know someone who is) and can get to a computer, go online to the list of Stand Downs held in conjunction with the VA: www.va.gov/HOMELESS/standdown.asp. The listings include a contact telephone number in your area. If you can't get online, call the Homeless Veterans Programs Office at 202-461-1857.

The National Coalition for Homeless Veterans also sponsors Stand Downs. Find it online at <http://nchv.org/index.cfm>. Click "Stand Down" on the left column. The NCHV site includes resource, health and job fairs. As with the VA list, each listing includes a local contact number, or call NCHV at 1-800-VET-HELP.

Don't let a lack of transportation keep you from getting the help you need at a Stand Down. If you inquire in advance, it's likely that you'll be given a ride to and from the event.



Craving Cranberries

Cranberries are often part of a holiday feast, but their nutritious tastiness is worth having anytime. Like many fruits, cranberries are high in fiber and vitamin C and low in calories and fat. A fresh cup of these tangy berries has just 51 calories, 5 grams of fiber and 24 percent of the vitamin C that the average person needs in a day.

Cranberries are packed with antioxidants that may help maintain heart health and reduce cholesterol. The tannins in cranberries may help prevent gum disease and urinary tract infections. In the lab, cranberries prevent bacteria from adhering to the walls of the urinary tract and the gum line. Ac-

cording to the November 2010 Tufts University Health and Nutrition Letter, "a meta-analysis of randomized controlled trials investigating cranberry intake and urinary-tract infections showed that there has been some benefit established in reducing the number of infections in women."

Cranberry juice is often the choice when trying to prevent infection. The fluid in the juice also helps maintain hydration, which is known to help prevent infection. Cranberries are very tart and are often consumed in combination with sugar. For example, a glass of cranberry juice cocktail has about 30 grams of sugar and 137 calories. To add whole cranberries to your diet year-round, try baking cranberry nut bread, sprinkling dried cranberries on salads or including

them in trail mix. Cranberries also can be used to decorate your home during the holidays. Try placing cranberries in a glass bowl with water and place a floating candle in the middle. You're only limited by your imagination and creativity. The Thanksgiving table would not be complete without the cranberry sauce. There's no need to open a can when this delicious Holiday Cranberry Sauce is so simple to make at home!

HOLIDAY CRANBERRY SAUCE

This sauce can be made ahead and will keep in an airtight container for two weeks in the refrigerator. Combine cranberry sauce with 2 tablespoons of Dijon mustard and pour it over leftover turkey, baked fish, chicken or pork. It's a delicious way to finish the dish and a wonderful use for any Thanksgiving leftovers.

- 1 1/2 cups chopped, peeled Granny Smith apples (about 1/2 pound)
- 1 cup packed light brown sugar
- 1/2 cup white grape juice
- 1 teaspoon ground ginger
- 1 teaspoon ground cinnamon

- 1 (12-ounce) package fresh cranberries, rinsed and drained

Combine all of the ingredients in a medium saucepan. Bring to a boil; reduce heat, and simmer until thick (about 15 minutes), stirring occasionally. Cool completely. Makes 16 (3 tablespoon) servings.




■ Overcoming a health challenge

The next time you, or someone you care about gets sick, you may find comfort from a surprising source—your computer. That’s because patients and their caregivers can now set up a website to keep family and friends informed about progress and any help needed and to receive information and good wishes.

It’s designed for one purpose—to help families facing a significant health challenge, communicate quickly, privately and efficiently online. Each day, over half a million people connect through the more than 222,000 personal sites that have been created.

The sites are uncluttered and free of advertising. To view a site, you must know the specific and unique site name. This helps restrict access to family and friends who have been given that name. Site authors can choose to add additional layers of privacy

and security, including requiring all visitors to register before they can view the site and requiring a password.

To meet the changing needs of those who use the site, recent service enhancements include a mobile website, a free iPhone app, the ability to be notified via text when a journal is updated and Facebook Connect so authors can easily notify their Facebook friends when they have a new journal entry to share.

It’s done through a nonprofit organization called CaringBridge, so access is free. You can make it as private as you like, design it to suit your taste and add health updates and photos whenever you like. Setting up is a simple process that takes just a few minutes. You can learn more or create a site for yourself or a loved one at www.CaringBridge.org.

Native American Gambling. The National Indian Gaming Commission reported that tribal casinos took in \$27.2 billion in 2011, a 2.6% increase over 2010's \$26.5 billion. The revenue came from 237 tribes operating 421 facilities. NIGC reports income by regions that contain multiple and, in the case of Oklahoma, split states. The biggest region is still the one containing California, with \$6.9 billion in revenue from 63 facilities. Close behind is the region containing Connecticut and New York with \$6.7 billion from 27 facilities.

Atlantic City. Resorts Casino Hotel is the latest to get on the Margaritaville

bandwagon, announcing an expansion that will incorporate the current hot theme. True to the model, the \$36 million project will include a restaurant, bar, retail, and a small casino. It's slated to open in May 2013. Also, New Jersey is reportedly considering ending Atlantic City's 36-year monopoly on casinos by allowing live gambling at the Meadowlands.

Illinois. After more than 20 years with riverboat casinos, Illinois is on the verge of getting video poker bars. Video poker and other machine-gambling games have been approved for suburban areas in the state. The games aren't yet live and only 18 licenses have been approved, but "about 1,000" applications have been submitted.


New York. Video keno-style "Quick Draw" machines are now legal in bars in New York. The bar owners keep .06% of the handle.

Louisiana. L'Auberge Casino & Hotel Baton Rouge opened in August. The Pinnacle Entertainment resort features a 205-room hotel, four restaurants, an events center, and a 74,000-square-foot casino with 1,500 slots and 50 table games, including poker.

Philippines. Four megaresorts, and possibly a fifth, are planned for a district located on reclaimed land in Manila Bay called "Entertainment City." The first, a \$1 billion complex owned by Bloomberry Resorts Corp., is

under construction and may open as early as the first quarter of 2013. The others, all projects of similar financial magnitude, are being developed by SM Group, Travellers International Hotel Group, and Tiger Resorts Leisure and Entertainment, respectively. The fifth, a just-announced \$1 billion project from Melco Crown and Belle Corp., is awaiting approval.

Online. Reports indicate that government principals have come to an agreement on the framework of a bill to legalize poker on the federal level and there's speculation that it will be introduced in November after the presidential election. Currently 16 states have made moves to legalize online gambling of some sort within their own jurisdictions. Meanwhile, following a bad quarterly report, online games giant Zynga says that it plans to offer real-money gambling by the middle of 2013, but only in international markets as of now.




“Maybe she is trying to win a game of ‘see how high you can reach,’” said Kate. We both glared at her. “Well, I have no good ideas.”

Handyman or Contractor

■ How to find a good one

Dear Savvy Senior,

Can you offer us seniors any tips for finding a good handyman to do some work around the house? I'm 71 and have had some bad luck lately with handymen who either don't show up or don't finish what they start.

Searching Senior

Dear Searching,

Hiring a local handyman can be a bit of a crapshoot. How do you find someone who will return your calls, show up on time, do the job right and finish it, all at a fair price? Here are some tips and resources that can help.

Who to Call

While it may seem obvious, your first step in finding a good handyman or trade specialist is to determine what all you need done. If, for example, you

have a small home repair or improvement project that doesn't require a lot of technical expertise, a handyman may be all you need. But if you have a job that involves electricity, plumbing, or heating or cooling systems, you're probably better off going with a licensed tradesman. Bigger jobs like home renovations or remodeling may require a general contractor.

Locating Services

Whatever type of work you need, the best way to find it is through referrals from people you trust. If your friends or family don't have any recommendations, turn to professionals in the field like local hardware or home improvement stores, or even real estate agents. The Internet can also help. Websites like servicemagic.com (877-800-3177) can put you in touch with prescreened, customer-rated service professionals in your area for free. Or try angleslist.com (888-888-5478), a membership service

that will connect you with high quality contractors and service companies with various types of expertise for a small monthly fee of \$7, or \$25 for a one-year membership. Angie's list will also provide you with ratings and reviews of local professionals who've done work for other members in your area, plus details about the type of work they've done, prices, professionalism and timeliness.

Another option for finding handyman services is through a local or national service company like mrhandyman.com and housedoctors.com. You'll probably pay more going through a company than you would with an independent handyman, but service companies typically promise professional workers who are screened, licensed, bonded and insured. To find these types of services in your community check your yellow pages or go to any Internet search engine and type in "handyman" plus your city and state.

Things to Know

Once you've located a few candidates, your next step is to get written estimates that list the materials, costs and details of the project. It's a good idea to get at least three estimates from different sources to be sure you're getting a fair deal.

You also need to find out if your candidates have an approved contractor or tradesman license. Using an unlicensed

worker in a state that requires a license is dangerous—you'll have little legal recourse if the job goes south. (To see which states license contractors, visit www.contractors-license.org.) Contractorcheck.com is another good resource for researching local contractors.

Also, ask to see their proof of insurance—which covers any damages they may cause while working on your home, and ask for several references from past jobs and check them. You can also check up on your candidates by contacting the Better Business Bureau or your local state consumer-protection agency to see if they have a history of complaints.

This month: Popular Facebook game goes mobile

Bingo Game Goes Mobile

Pocket Gamer reports that one of the top Facebook game developers, Buffalo Studios, made its first foray into the realm of mobile gaming with the release of Bingo Rush. The iOS Bingo Rush is a single-player freemium version of Buffalo's Bingo Blitz, a current Top 10 Facebook game. Like its Facebook predecessor, Bingo Rush is a "reinvention of Bingo." In order to translate the social Bingo Blitz into the single-player Bingo Rush, several minor changes have been made to adjust the pacing of the game. A player's success on a level is gauged by how many Bingos they can collect in a timed round. Players can control the speed and pace of the game with a "Next Ball" button which advances to the next ball and saves them seconds if the number called is not on their card. Additionally, players receive power-ups that fill up

multiple spaces on the board with a single blitz and may opt to purchase Elite Power-Ups to change the steady pace of a standard Bingo game. Bingo Rush is available on the App Store for free, although players are limited by the amount of hands they can play due to the cost of Bingo cards available on each level.

Carnival Bingo in Virginia

Some people come to the annual Wachapreague (Virginia) Volunteer Firemen's Carnival for the rides, some come for the food, some come for the live music. But perhaps the most loyal and frequent carnival-goers are the Bingo players. What's the attraction? They like sitting out in the open. They are allowed to smoke because it is outdoors, they get to see their friends, and the get to play a LOT of Bingo, the Delmarva, Maryland, *Daily News* reported. Shore natives who have moved away even plan their vacation time so they can come home for the carnival—to play Bingo. Most nights around 100 games are called. At a quarter a card,

they can take in nearly \$4,000—leaving almost \$2,000 for the fire company after the prize money is given out. The prizes are a 50-50 split of the money players pay. In the past, winners received coupons, which they collected and redeemed for prizes like toasters and lamps. The prizes, costing between one and 10 coupons each, were lined up in three tiers along the Bingo booth's front wall, where players could ponder which ones they coveted as they played. As prizes got more expensive for the fire company to purchase, they switched in the mid-1980s to cash prizes. It takes up to 70 volunteers each night to operate the whole carnival.

Cow-Pie Bingo

A wide range of animals, a pet-dressing contest and Cow-Pie Bingo were among the attractions at the Morris County 4-H Fair at Chubb Park in Chester Township, New Jersey. The entertainment tent featured live musical performances and interactive demonstrations while other tents housed animals belonging to fair entrants, including

dogs, horses, reptiles, poultry, rabbits and small animals. The *New Jersey Daily Record* further reported that other activities included pony and hay rides, a model airplane demonstration, watermelon-eating and cake-decorating contests, a talent show, dress-a-pet and dress-a-cage contests, a children's pet show and amusement rides. Making its debut at this year's fair was Cow Pie Bingo, a game with an unusual agricultural twist. A fenced area was marked with lines to turn it into a Bingo grid, and fairgoers were able to choose specific squares. Then a cow was turned out to graze in the area. The location of the cow's first "pie" determined the winner.





Workers Playing Bingo

■ **Is it okay to play where you work?**

Dear Aunt Bingo,

Where I play Bingo they offer double sessions, where we play Bingo for about two hours, have a 20-minute break, and then play for a couple more hours. What I object to is that during the first session there will be a number of workers who will play Bingo with the rest of us. When the session is over, they will stop playing and work for the second session while a group of workers that worked during the first session will stop working and play Bingo for the second session. I am not claiming that there is cheating going on or that these workers are winning more than anyone else. What I object to is that it looks bad for workers to be players at the same games where they work. There is also a cliquishness about it, with these worker/players being all loud and chummy and having their exclusive seats, etc. This behavior tarnishes the games for the rest of us. —*KP, Ohio*

Dear KP,

I am never comfortable at a Bingo where a large group of workers also makes up a large and vocal group of that Bingo's players. And that discomfort comes from the exact issues you bring up. Who wants to play Bingo at a hall that seems to be operating for a select few "insiders" while the majority of players sit on the sidelines tolerating their antics? Not to mention the appearance of impropriety that results. Did these workers pay to play? Do they have some kind of inside advantage over the other players? When one of them does Bingo, was it somehow fixed? Such questions are bound to float about and fester, creating a highly negative atmosphere at a Bingo hall.

Regulations differ from state to state, but whether laws forbid workers from playing Bingo at the halls where they work or not, common sense would dictate that it should be kept low key at best—and something a Bingo manager should be sensitive to. I would be interested in hearing from Bingo workers who are also players. Does the hall where you work allow you to play there? Do you play Bingo elsewhere? Are you concerned that you playing Bingo might upset regular Bingo players?

I'd very much like to hear your opinions and experiences. —*Aunt Bingo*

Dear Aunt Bingo,

Recently I was asked to fill in as a caller for our school's Bingo. I volunteered at Bingo quite a bit and had an idea of what was involved so I agreed to do it. The caller I was to cover for gave me an orientation on the console and the next week I was ready to go. It was a nightmare! First off, I didn't expect to experience such stage fright, but those 800 eyes staring at me when I looked across the room really gave me the shakes. The console was programmed to do most of the work, but I still was sweating bullets. A

person called out that they couldn't hear me. Another complained that I was going too slow. Someone else griped that a number had to be missing (they were all checked before the games started). And don't get me started on the dirty looks and mumbled swear words that shot my way from the unlucky people who missed by one number. I really have to hand it to the men and women who get up there and call every week. They have to keep track of a lot of stuff and keep a lot of people engaged and happy. Maybe over time I'd get the hang of it as well. But we will never know, because I am never EVER going to do that again as long as I live! —*Traumatized in Arizona*

Dear Traumatized,

Stage fright is horrible. I remember my first experience with it. I was 7 years old and had to perform in front of a group of strangers at my first and only piano recital. My face flushed, my mouth went dry, my hands felt like wooden blocks—it was a nightmare. It's a wonder I made it through without passing out. That piano recital performance lasted minutes. You were at the control center of that Bingo session for hours! You should be proud that you hung in there and made it to the end. Congratulations! And congratulations as well to all the Bingo callers out there who keep the games moving and seem to do so almost effortlessly. We may give you dirty looks and mumble swear words under our breath when you don't call our number. But down deep we still appreciate how hard you work for us. —*Aunt Bingo*

Those scenes had to be shot very quickly, though, since the horses had a tendency to lick off their colors.

First Idaho Winner

KTVB-TV reported that Steve Colson of Idaho won \$3.4 million in the Idaho Lottery's Hot Lotto game. His ticket matched all five numbers and the Hot Ball, making Colson the first jackpot winner in Idaho Lottery history. Colson, a sixth generation Idahoan, is a retired U.S. Army veteran with 22 years of service, according to lottery officials. Colson plans to take a one-time cash lump sum prize of \$2.6 million. With the winnings, he plans to take his father and family on a fishing trip to Alaska, donate to the Wounded Warrior Project, build his dream motorcycle and dedicate it to the fallen soldiers in Iraq. "I'm going to take care of my family and my friends, then save the rest," Colson told lottery officials.

Micro-scratching Lottery Tick-

ets


What began as a complaint from a lottery customer about the loss of \$15 led to an undercover operation and eventually the arrest of a store clerk for lottery fraud, KSTP-TV reported. A man told the Minnesota State Lottery he'd bought a scratch ticket at the Casablanca Market in Hopkins. He scratched it and found he'd won \$15. But, when he took the ticket to the Lottery booth at the Minnesota State Fair, he was told the ticket had already been redeemed. Lottery Security checked the records they had from Casablanca Market and "found that a large number of manual validations of scratch tickets were being run at the retailer," an investigator wrote in a criminal complaint. According to the complaint, investigators suspected "micro-scratching." Micro-scratching is a term used by investigators to describe a particular method of discerning whether a ticket is a winner or a non-winner in a way that

is largely undetectable. Micro-scratching consists of someone using a small sharp object, such as a razor blade or a small knife, to remove a microscopic portion of the inks, coatings, and sealants covering the play area of the scratch ticket in an attempt to reveal the three digit validation code." An investigation revealed that a clerk at the store was micro-scratching the tickets. The clerk was charged with two counts of State Lottery Fraud, two counts of Gambling-Cheating, and a single count of Gambling-Attempted Cheating.

Largest Ever Won in Iowa Lotto

Winners of a \$241 million Powerball jackpot, the largest ever won by an Iowa Lottery player, claimed their prize in Des Moines, but they refused to identify themselves. The Des Moines Register has reported that a bus carrying about 50 people from Cedar Rapids pulled up to Iowa Lottery headquarters on Grand Avenue shortly before noon. The group

included almost all of the 20 workers from the Quaker Oats plant in Cedar Rapids who jointly purchased the winning ticket as part of pool. The workers wore red t-shirts and had broad smiles as they got off the bus. They whooped and hollered. Asked how they felt, they responded "Great!" and "Awesome!" Although none would provide their full name, they said they are members of the Retail, Wholesale, Department Store Union Local 110. The winners took a lump-sum cash payout, each receiving \$5.6 million after taxes are paid. The total lump-sum payout was about \$160 million before state and federal taxes were deducted.


