German Mugs

Q: Your comments on five very old mugs? I was told that because they are German, they are not worth much. Is this true? —*Rita, Milford, Maine*

A: Spotting the mug shown in a photo as a beer mug, we asked Andre Ammeloux of the Stein Auction Company in Illinois to take a look.

Without info on size and given the mediocre photo sent, it was hard for him to judge. But the mark on the bottom, "Simmons and Hammond, Portland, ME 420 Germany," indicates that the mugs were German made for export to a specific merchant in Portland.

Ammeloux pegged the set as circa 1900-1930. Marking a merchant's name at the bottom was common in the early 1900s, so they are no doubt early rather than later.

Brewery collectors pay more for steins or mugs that advertise a specific brewery, said Ammeloux. Digging further, we learned in

www.artfact.com, a database of art and auction results, that a stoneware jug advertising a root beer syrup, marked Simmons and Hammond was listed for a 2003 Pennsylvania auction. No result was given. The drink connection establishes Simmons & Hammond as a brewery or business connected with bar goods. Ammeloux figures the mugs might bring \$100 to \$150 each at auction. I'd post them on eBay as both advertising and breweriana collectibles. Five matching mugs are an appealing lot!

As for price being lower because they are German—nonsense! The reverse is true. Beware of friends bearing values. Unless they know their beans, free advice is worthless, or worse—damaging.

If a prospective buyer fed you that line, you were a smart collector to pull back. That's a lowball ploy.




Sexual Assault

■ **Reviewing PTSD Claims for**

Congresswoman Chellie Pingree asked the Department of Veterans Affairs to review PTSD claims that had been turned down, claims submitted by survivors of sexual assault while in the military. The VA agreed, but dragged its feet about notifying victims of a change in policy.

If you're a survivor of military sexual assault, here are some things you need to know:

Many of the responses to sexual assault can lead to PTSD if untreated: trouble sleeping, trouble with attention and memory, abusing alcohol and drugs, feeling numb and more. If you have PTSD due to sexual assault and filed a claim for benefits, your initial claim was no doubt turned down.

You should have received a letter by now from the VA saying it will re-evaluate your claim. However,

many veterans were not sent this letter. It's up to you to ask for a re-evaluation. Review the information on Pingree's site (pingree.house.gov/mstclaims) first. In many cases, the VA ignored "secondary markers," which are evidence an assault occurred. These include records from law enforcement or rape crisis centers, tests for sexually transmitted diseases, episodes of depression or anxiety, and substance abuse.

You can ask for a re-evaluation of your denied claim by calling the VA at 1-800-827-1000.

Also on Pingree's site are links to VA Form 21-4138 and VA Form 21-0187A, statements in support of your claim.

Meanwhile, you don't have to wait on the VA's decision to get counseling for PTSD. Get more information at www.ptsd.va.gov.

Pingree also wants to hear from you about your experience with the review process of your claim. Scroll to the bottom of her web page and leave your comments. If you prefer to send a letter, call her Washington, D.C., office at 202-225-6116 for a mailing address. She really does want to help.

■ A vacationers' paradise

From Chicago to Springfield, Rockford to Paducah, Illinois is a vacationers' paradise, with a huge selection of cities and experiences for travelers to enjoy. Of course, Dan's suggestions barely scratch the surface. For those interested in the oddball, there's always a trip to Dungeons & Dragons Park in Carbondale, the Popeye and Friends statues in Chester, the Super Museum dedicated to all things Superman in Metropolis, the fire-breathing Kaskaskia Dragon in Vandalia, the Rt. 66 Hall of Fame in Pontiac, the world's largest cross in Effingham, the albino squirrels

of Olney City Park, the famed two-story outhouse in Gays, Santa Anna's wooden leg in Springfield, or the world's largest catsup bottle in Collinsville.

The city of Chicago is obviously crammed with countless things to see and do—not only Navy Pier, but Skydeck Chicago, Shedd Aquarium, Millennium Park, Field Museum, the downtown Theater District, the Art Institute of Chicago, Second City Improv, John Hancock Observatory, Buckingham Fountain, the Adler Planetarium and Astronomy Museum and so much more.

There's plenty more throughout the state—Anderson Japanese Gardens in Rockford, the Abraham Lincoln Presidential Library and Museum in Springfield, New Salem State Historic Site in Petersburg, Amish Country Tours in Arthur and Arcola, Cahokia Mounds State Historic Site in Collinsville, the Black Hawk State Historic Site in Rock Island, Tempel Lipizzans in Wadsworth, Shawnee Hills Wine Trail in Carbondale, Children's Museum of Illinois in Decatur, and the Tinker Swiss Cottage Museum and Gardens in Rockford to name but a few.

Illinois is also gaming friendly, offering many casino choices—particularly riverboat gambling—in Alton (Argosy's Alton Belle Casino), Aurora (Hollywood Casino), East Peoria (Par-A-Dice Hotel Casino), East St. Louis (Casino Queen and Hotel), Elgin (Grand Victoria - Elgin Riverboat Resort), Joliet (Argosy's Empress Casino and Harrah's Joliet Casino and Hotel), Metropolis (Harrah's Metropolis Casino) and Rock Island (Jumer's Casino Rock Island).



Health Screenings ■ Important for Seniors

Dear Savvy Senior,

What health screenings are recommended for seniors? My husband and I are very proactive about staying healthy and are wondering which screenings we really need.

Alive and Kicking

Dear Alive,

The types of health screenings a person should get will depend on their age, gender, underlying health conditions and family history. Here's what you should know.

Recommended Tests

One of the problems with our health care system is that many Americans, and their doctors, seem to think that better health means more medical care, including as many screenings and tests as possible. But that's not necessarily true.

According to the U.S. Preventive Services Task Force (USPSTF)—an independent panel of medical experts that reviews the effectiveness of screenings—many screening tests are unproven and can not only waste your time and money but also cause more harm than good. Here's what the task force recommends (see www.ahrq.gov/ppip/50plus) as essential tests for you and your husband, and when you should start getting them.

Everyone Over 50

Blood pressure: Have it checked at least every two years—more frequent if you find your pressure is above 130/85.

Cholesterol: At least every five years, get a blood cholesterol test that measures your LDL "bad" cholesterol, HDL "good" cholesterol and triglycerides. It should be more frequently if you smoke, have diabetes or a family history.

Colorectal cancer: Begin regular screening starting at age 50. Your doctor can help you decide which test is right for you.

Diabetes: While the USPSTF recommends being tested only if you have high blood pressure, the American Diabetes Association recommends a blood glucose test every three years starting at age 45. If you're obese, have high blood pressure, high cholesterol, a family history of diabetes or are over age 65, check it yearly.

Women Only

Mammograms: The controversial new guideline by the USPSTF now recommends screenings every other year beginning at age 50. However, the American Cancer Society still recommends annual screenings starting at age 40.

Pap smear: To detect cervical cancer this test is recommended every three years, however women who've had a total hysterectomy, or who are age 65 or older and have had three negative pap smears in a row usually don't need to be tested.

Bone density scan: Osteoporosis screening is recommended starting at age 65—earlier in post-menopausal women with risk factors.

Men Only

Abdominal ultrasound: Men between the ages of 65 and 75 that have ever smoked should be screened for an aortic aneurysm, which can develop over many years before bursting.

PSA screening: The jury is still out on whether men should get the PSA (prostate-specific antigen) blood test or digital rectal exam to detect prostate cancer. Men, age 40 and older, should talk to their doctor about their risk factors and what they should do.

Other Screenings

Some additional screenings to consider are skin examinations by a dermatologist to check for skin cancers; depression screening if you've been feeling down; dental checkups at least once a year; HIV screening if you've had unprotected sex with multiple partners; annual eye exams starting at age 60 to check of age-related eye diseases; hearing tests by an audiologist every five years starting at 65; and for women 50 and older, a thyroid-simulating hormone test every five years to check for thyroid disease.

Vaccinations

In addition to health screenings, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention recommends that all seniors, 65 and older get a one-time pneumonia (pneumococcal) shot, and those over 60 should be vaccinated for shingles. It's also recommended that everyone over 50 get a yearly flu shot, along with a tetanus-diphtheria-pertussis (Tdap) booster which is recommended every 10 years (if you're over 65, you only need a tetanus-diphtheria booster).

An Altercation

A shooting at Potawatomi Bingo Casino in Milwaukee came under investigation after a woman was shot in the leg over a confrontation with her boyfriend, resulting in a chaotic scene for frightened visitors, CBS 58 News reported. Police said that a Milwaukee woman was inside the Bingo casino gambling with her boyfriend when the couple apparently got into an argument. The woman's brother tried to intervene in the altercation. At some point, a gun was fired, and the woman was shot in the leg. The woman was taken to a nearby hospital, where she was listed in stable condition at press time. Her boyfriend was arrested for the incident.

Bill Blocked Again

Maine officials have blocked a bill which would have allowed the Penobscot Indian Nation to upgrade its dated Bingo operation, asserting that the Nation's proposed Class II Bingo machines are really Class III slot machines—a claim that's refuted by two of the most reputable companies in the country that manufacture, test and certify gaming machines. According to *Indian Country Today* Media.com, this is the fifth year in a row that the Penobscot Indian Nation has tried to pass a bill to enhance its existing gaming operation—a 30-year-old traditional Bingo enterprise that uses a Bingo caller and Bingo cards. And it's the fifth year in a row its efforts have been thwarted by the state. This year's bill would have allowed the Nation and the three other Wabanaki tribes—the Houlton Band of Maliseet Indians, the Aroostook Band of Micmacs and the Passamaquoddy Tribe—to operate high-stakes electronic Bingo games and lift current restrictions

limiting the Penobscot operation to 27 weekends a year and the Passamaquoddy's play to 100 times per year.

Audience members play Bingo and Broadway Trivia for the chance to win prizes, tickets to Broadway and off-Broadway shows, free cocktails and cash prizes. Randy Rainbow's Broadway Bingo is located at 348 West 52nd Street.

Benefit Bingo

The Carlisle Sentinel reported that a benefit Bingo was held at the Shippensburg Firefighter's Activity Center in Shippensburg, Pennsylvania, to raise money for the Children's Organ Transplant Association and for Alex Callan, to help offset his transplant-related expenses from a double lung transplant. Vendors, raffles, door prizes and more were all part of the event. Lunch was included in the ticket price, with food being served before the games began and during breaks. Bingo was sponsored by the Vigilant Hose Company.

Eight Years Overdue

The cook at the Snack Shack in Kentville, Nova Scotia, said she knew something was up when a man knocked at her door at 7:20 a.m. asking her to marry him. Turns out she's \$3 million richer. Diner owner Sam Toulany said his wife, Wafaa, and four workers bought a winning lottery ticket worth \$15,222,777.40. CBC Canada reported that Toulany said a customer came into the store and told the staff someone in Kentville had won. "He said 'I heard on the radio a \$15 million ticket was sold in Kentville.' So the wife decided to check the ticket they shared. She couldn't believe it so she asked me to verify it and sure enough," he said. The staff has been playing together for eight years. So far they're talking about buying cars and travelling. Toulany said he'll sell the restaurant.

High-Scoring Scratch Off

It's better to be lucky than good. Just ask Cary Collings. He recently found himself with a high-scoring scratch-off ticket. Then, when he bought another, he had one worth even more—all in the same 24-hour period. According to the Washington State Lottery, Collings' day started off on the right note when he won \$55,555 on a scratch-off ticket. On his way to cash in his ticket, he stopped at a store to buy more. One of them ended up being worth \$200,000. Q13 Fox.com reported that Collings, who lives in Puyallup, Washington, plans to use some of his winnings to pay off debts. He said he is undecided on what to do with the rest of his windfall but has no plans to quit his job.

A Neighborly Win

On the same day Michael Yun won the runoff election in the Jersey City Heights to land a seat on the City Council, a \$1 million Mega Millions lottery ticket was sold at his store—Garden State News. "She's a regular customer," Yun, 59, said about the lottery winner as reported by NJ.com. "She comes almost every day and is a heavy player. She deserved to have it. This person is very, very nice to us and she's a good neighbor and I'm glad to see we have another millionaire in our district." And the million-dollar winner isn't the only one to cash in on the prize

winnings. As the seller of the winning ticket, Garden State News receives \$10,000 from the lottery commission.

Drawing Held Up

A suspicious package near a Texas Lottery facility recently forced a delay of the nightly drawing and the reporting of the results, officials said. Austin police instructed Texas Lottery personnel to evacuate the drawing studio on Sixth Street as a precaution, and the drawing was moved to a backup location, in accordance with official rules, a lottery spokeswoman told the Austin Statesman. The suspicious package did not end up presenting a threat.

Reno. The former Silver Club will be reopened as a slots-only casino called Bourbon Street. The new casino, located in Sparks (across the street from John Ascuaga's Nugget), hopes to debut some time this month.

Atlantic City. After struggling with what was tabbed an anti-gambler stance, Revel has come full circle in adding gambler-attractive promotions resort-wide, including changing its official name to Revel Casino Hotel to emphasize the *casino*. With a new slogan, "Gamblers Wanted," the resort has reversed its non-smoking policy, initiated a pet-friendly campaign called "Ruff it at Revel," added a new high-limit slot area, and launched an extremely liberal slot promotion.

Iowa. Harrah's Council Bluffs Casino and Hotel has opened with 600 slots and 18 table games. The casino was converted from the former Kaneshville Queen riverboat.

Louisiana. The Margaritaville Resort Casino has opened in Bossier City. The resort features the usual Jimmy Buffet themed bars and eateries, a 30,000-square-foot casino, and what's touted as the "world's largest indoor volcano."

Mississippi. Isle Casino, the first casino to open in Mississippi, is now the Golden Nugget Casino Biloxi. The rebranded casino opened in late June following the completion of the first phase of a \$100 million renovation.

Rhode Island. Table-game gambling has gone live at the Twin River casino in Lincoln. The state's other casino, Newport Grand, remains slots only.

Colorado. Doc Holliday Casino has closed. It was one of Central City's original casinos.

Online. The expected debut of the World Series of Poker's on-

line site hasn't materialized amid rumors that there are ongoing problems with its software. As of now, Ultimate Poker remains the only legal option for playing poker online.

New legislation has been introduced by New York congressman Peter King that would establish a federal licensing and regulatory system for online gambling, and at least one other bill is reportedly in the works, as attempts continue to be made to head off state-by-state legalization. PokerStars CEO mark Scheinberg has paid a \$50 million fine to the Department of Justice to settle a complaint associated with the 2011 "Black Friday" crack-down on Internet poker sites. It's the latest move in Stars' ongoing attempts to open a path into the legal U.S. gambling market. PokerStars forfeited \$731 million last year to settle related charges and it appears that its bid to buy the Atlantic Club in Atlantic City will be unsuccessful. Meanwhile, New Jersey has established a deadline of June 30 for affiliations to be solidified between Atlantic City casinos and potential partners. Thus far, partnerships have been announced for Borgata/Bwin.party and CET/888 Holdings.

Of the three I asked about it, all answered with an explanation that was basically grounded in their particular superstition. One said she always wants the packs that are fifth and tenth in the stack. Another told me she looks for her lucky number—I think it was B-10—and only gets packs with B-10 on them. The third person said he just likes the option of choosing his own, and looks for one with dark ink which he finds easiest to read. That's as much as I've ever learned about it...except that it bugs a lot of people in line behind them because they think it looks fishy. Sounds like you did too. —*Guy*

Lower the Salt, Boost the Flavor

Salt (sodium) is abundant in the American diet. The problem is that sodium can contribute to high blood pressure, and high blood pressure can increase the risk of developing cardiovascular disease, congestive heart failure and kidney disease. Some people can lower their blood pressure by cutting sodium intake. It is important to know where sodium lurks in your food and how you can eat less of it. According to the American Heart Association, the average American consumes 2,900 to 4,300 milligrams of sodium per day. It recommends no more than 2,400 milligrams per day, so most people should decrease their sodium intake. For some people, the recommendation is even less. Adults age 51 and older, blacks and people with high blood pressure, diabetes or chronic kidney disease tend to be more responsive to the blood-pressure-raising effects of sodium. That is why the recommendation for sodium for this group

is no more than 1,500 milligrams per day. Research has found that as sodium is decreased, blood pressure also is decreased. Pre-prepared frozen food, canned soups and other canned foods are high in sodium. In addition, bread, chicken and chicken mixed dishes each account for 7 percent of the sodium that is consumed in the United States. Pizza accounts for 6 percent, while pasta and pasta dishes account for 5 percent of sodium consumption.

There are many things you can do to reduce sodium intake:

Read food labels, which list how much sodium is in each serving of food. Pay particular attention to salted snacks, fish canned in oil or brine like sardines or tuna, luncheon meats, canned foods and juices, cheese, seasoned salts, meat tenderizers and condiments such as ketchup, mayonnaise and salad dressing. A frozen dinner can have an entire day's worth of sodium in one meal!

- Eat lots of fresh fruits and vegetables, which have minimal sodium.
- Prepare your own food to allow you to control the amount of salt that goes in to it.
- Use spices and herbs instead of salt and seasoned salt to enhance the flavor of foods.

• Ask that no salt be added to food when eating out.

You may think you like salt so much that you could never give it up. Just remember that you were not born loving salt; we develop a taste for it. If you work at it, you can learn to desire it less. When you do, you will savor the natural flavor of food more as your blood pressure goes down. My recipe for Skillet Pork Chops with Orange and Fennel Sauce has no added salt and uses citrus fruit and their juices and

spices to boost flavor. You won't miss the saltshaker with this delicious recipe! (Additional information provided by Tammy Roberts, MS, RD, LD, Nutrition and Health Education Specialist, Bates County, University of Missouri Extension.)

SKILLET PORK CHOPS WITH ORANGE SAUCE

- 3 large navel oranges
- 2 teaspoons orange zest
- 2 teaspoons lemon juice
- 1 tablespoon poultry seasoning
- 2 teaspoons cumin
- 1 teaspoon freshly ground pepper
- 1/2 teaspoon honey
- 1/2 teaspoon cornstarch
- 1/4 teaspoon cayenne pepper
- 4 4-ounce boneless pork chops, 1/2-inch thick, trimmed
- 3 tablespoons olive oil
- 1 large fennel bulb, cored and thinly sliced
- 1 medium onion, chopped
- 3 cups baby spinach

1. Remove the orange skin with a zester or use a vegetable peeler to remove thin strips of orange skin (the zest) without the bitter white pith. If you're not using a zester, chop the orange skin finely and place it into a medium-sized bowl. Reserve some orange segments for garnish, if desired.
2. Squeeze the orange juice into the bowl. Stir in the lemon juice, 1/2 tablespoon poultry seasoning, 1 teaspoon cumin, pepper, honey, cornstarch and cayenne pepper.

Set the bowl aside.

3. Rub pork chops on both sides with 1 tablespoon olive oil. Season on both sides with the remaining poultry seasoning and cumin. Heat remaining 2 tablespoons oil in a large nonstick skillet over medium heat. Add chops and cook until browned and just cooked through, 2 to 3 minutes per side. Transfer to plate and tent with foil to keep warm.
4. Add sliced fennel and onion to the pan and cook, stirring, for 1 minute. Stir in the spinach and cook until slightly wilted, about 3 minutes. Transfer contents of the pan to a platter.
5. Add the reserved orange juice mixture to the pan. Pour off any accumulated juices from the pork chops and add them to the pan. Cook, stirring constantly, until slightly thickened, about 1 minute. Serve the pork chops on the fennel and spinach salad. Drizzle with the pan sauce. Makes 4 servings.

Bingo Etiquette

■ Suggested rules to follow

Dear Aunt Bingo,

Is it just me, or have some Bingo players lost respect and understanding for the word “silence?” I mean, shut up! The rules have been explained and Bingo has started, so why do they continue talking? To elaborate, my husband and I recently started going to Bingo after my sister said that it was an enjoyable experience. We looked into it and found several nearby. Not knowing what to expect the first time around, we showed up gung-ho and ready to learn and play. Our first experience was a little bit

of a struggle due to some people’s need to continuously talk and talk and talk! On one occasion, the Bingo caller pointed out some talkers and threatened to escort them out. Instead of them owning up to the disrespectful rule-breaking, they began arguing with the caller. My husband and I just shook our heads. Has it come to this? We are all over 18, so why become insulted and embarrassed when you are pointed out of the crowd. Geez, you’re an adult. You were blabbing your big mouth, were told to shut up, so apologize and shut up!

And let’s not forget about the phones. My phone has the vibrate function—why don’t they use theirs?

Following is Bingo etiquette my husband and I follow.

1. Pipe down and keep quiet.
2. Watch out for lucky seats.
3. Don’t be a parrot.
4. Don’t take out your frustrations on the caller.
5. Pay close attention to the game pattern.
6. Think before you call out Bingo.
7. Silence your cell phone.
8. Be helpful and respectful.

We’ve learned that the majority of Bingo players (about 90%) are elderly. After carrying on a conversation with some elderly folks near our seat prior to game time, we

harm than good. Here’s what the task force recommends (see www.ahrq.gov/ppip/50plus) as essential tests for you and your husband, and when you should start getting them.

Everyone Over 50

Blood pressure: Have it checked at least every two years—more frequent if you find your pressure is above 130/85.

Cholesterol: At least every five years, get a blood cholesterol test that measures your LDL “bad” cholesterol, HDL “good” cholesterol and triglycerides. It should be more frequently if you smoke, have diabetes or a family history.

Colorectal cancer: Begin regular screening starting at age 50. Your doctor can help you decide which test is right for you.

Diabetes: While the USPSTF recommends being tested only if you have high blood pressure, the American Diabetes Association recommends a blood glucose test every three years starting at age 45. If you’re obese, have high blood pressure, high cholesterol, a family history of diabetes or are over age 65, check it yearly.

Women Only

Mammograms: The controversial new guideline by the USPSTF now recommends screenings every other year beginning at age 50. However, the American Cancer Society still recommends annual screenings starting at age 40.

Pap smear: To detect cervical cancer this test is recommended every three

years, however women who’ve had a total hysterectomy, or who are age 65 or older and have had three negative pap smears in a row usually don’t need to be tested.

Bone density scan: Osteoporosis screening is recommended starting at age 65—earlier in post-menopausal women with risk factors.

Men Only
Abdominal ultrasound: Men between the ages of 65 and 75 that have ever smoked should be screened for an aortic aneurysm, which can develop over many years before bursting.

PSA screening: The jury is still out on whether men should get the PSA (prostate-specific antigen) blood test or digital rectal exam to detect prostate cancer. Men, age 40 and older, should talk to their doctor about their risk factors and what they should do.

Other Screenings
Some additional screenings to consider are skin examinations by a dermatologist to check for skin cancers; depression screening if you’ve been feeling down; dental checkups at least once a year; HIV screening if you’ve had unprotected sex with multiple partners; annual eye exams starting at age 60 to check of age-related eye diseases; hearing tests by an audiologist every five years starting at 65; and for women 50 and older, a thyroid-simulating hormone test every five years to check for thyroid disease.

Health Screenings

■ Important for Seniors

Dear Savvy Senior,

What health screenings are recommended for seniors? My husband and I are very proactive about staying healthy and are wondering which screenings we really need.

Alive and Kicking

Dear Alive,

The types of health screenings a person should get will depend on their age, gender, underlying health conditions and family history. Here’s what you should know.

Recommended Tests

One of the problems with our health care system is that many Americans, and their doctors, seem to think that better health means more medical care, including as many screenings and tests as possible. But that’s not necessarily true. According to the U.S. Preventive Services Task Force (USPSTF)—an independent panel of medical experts that reviews the effectiveness of screenings—many screening tests are unproven and can not only waste your time and money but also cause more

Vaccinations

In addition to health screenings, the

Centers for Disease Control and Prevention recommends that all seniors, 65 and older get a one-time pneumonia (pneumococcal) shot, and those over 60 should be vaccinated for shingles. It’s also recommended that everyone over 50 get a yearly flu shot, along with a tetanus-diphtheria-pertussis (Tdap) booster which is recommended every 10 years (if you’re over 65, you only need a tetanus-diphtheria booster).
