### Political Mugs

**Q:** Frankoma Pottery celebrates their 80th anniversary this year. Any info on their entire set of political mugs, including the rare Nixon/Ford mug? —*Joe, Tulsa, Okla.*

**A:** An American family-founded firm, Frankoma was the Rodney Dangerfield of potteries. You either loved it or ignored it. Other than regionally, Frankoma couldn't seem to be taken seriously or get much respect. Wares tended not to generate much general excitement.

Founded in Norman, Okla., in 1933 by John Frank (hence the name), the pottery used Oklahoma clay in making art pottery to dinnerware. In 1938 the company moved to Sapulpa, Okla. Light clay was used until 1954, when Sapulpa's red clay was adopted.

Elephant shape political mugs launched in the late '60s. The Democratic donkey appeared in 1975. Starting in 1977, election year mugs had president and vice president names on the winning party mug.

Several fires, a bankruptcy, the sale of the company, and the resale to one Joe Ragosta (the very letter writer above!) ensued.

Now, Joe, as a Tulsa resident and collector (not to mention the new owner of the company), I'm sure you know about the Frankoma Family Collector's Association.

Check them online at [www.frankoma.org](http://www.frankoma.org) to read your press and see values they put on the mugs. While you're at it, check eBay to see how the mugs fare there.

I wish you well in bringing Frankoma back. Tulsa deserves a thriving pottery. And do think about jazzing those mugs up. Might make them more sellable.

country. It appears, however, that veterans can't ask to be included. The VA will select claims for the program that can benefit from the legal intervention. Those veterans will get a letter asking if they'd like to participate. The letter will list all the possible options for representation, such as Veteran Service Organizations—and the free lawyers. Those veterans also will be told of a free hotline phone number to call to find legal representation. The attorneys will receive training, with the end goal of putting together complete "ready to approve" claims. Attorneys and veterans will be linked up based on location and complexity of the claim. Watch your mail for a letter from the VA if you live in the two pilot locations and have a claim in. This is just one of the steps the VA is taking to clear the claims backlog by 2015, and on the surface, it sounds good. Fingers crossed.

## Pilot Program to Speed Claims

Veterans with a claim lost in the pile at the Department of Veterans Affairs will be interested in a pilot program about to be launched. The American Bar Association and Legal Services Corporation are joining with the VA to help veterans get faster decisions on their claims—for free.

This pro bono program will provide attorneys to unrepresented veterans who need help with portions of their claims that require evidence to be gathered. According to a VA news release, the development stage of assembling a claim can be the longest part, taking more than 200 days. The first steps in the pilot program will open at the Regional Offices in St. Petersburg, Fla., and Chicago. Veterans at other locations also might be included if circumstances warrant it. The plan is for the program to spread quickly across the





**Hot-Chocolate Pudding**

Kids and adults will savor every spoonful of this orange-accented chocolate dream from our sister publication *Red-book*.

**Orange Whipped Cream**

- 1/4 cup heavy cream
- 1 1/2 teaspoons sugar
- 1/8 teaspoon grated orange zest

**Pudding**

- 1/2 cup sugar
- 1 1/2 tablespoons cornstarch
- 3/4 cup milk
- 1/2 cup heavy cream
- 1 pinch salt
- 9 ounces bittersweet chocolate, chopped
- 2 tablespoons unsalted butter
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract

1. In a small bowl, with a handheld electric mixer on medium-high speed, beat cream, sugar and orange zest until

soft peaks form. Refrigerate while making pudding.

2. In a medium saucepan, combine sugar and cornstarch; whisk in milk, cream and salt until blended. Cook over medium heat, whisking gently, just until mixture thickens and comes to a boil. Remove pan from heat; stir in chocolate, butter and vanilla until smooth. With a handheld electric mixer on medium-high speed, beat until light and fluffy.

3. Divide pudding into 4 (6-ounce) ramekins; top each with a dollop of Orange Whipped Cream. Serve immediately. Serves 4.




## Eye care

### ■ Coverage and services for retirees

Dear Savvy Senior,

Does Medicare cover eye care? I had excellent vision insurance through my employer for many years but lost it when I retired, and now am confused as to what Medicare actually covers. What can you tell me?

*Living on a Budget*

Dear Living,

Many retirees are confused with what Medicare will and won't cover when it comes to eye care. Here's a breakdown of how Medicare handles different types of vision care services, along with some additional tips that can help you get affordable care when needed.

### Medicare Coverage

If you have original Medicare (Part A and B), it's important to know that "routine" vision care like eye exams, eye refractions, eyeglasses or contact lenses

are generally not covered. But, "medically necessary" eye care usually is. Here's a list of what is covered:

- Eye surgeries: Any surgical procedure that helps repair the function of the eye like cataract removal, cornea transplant, glaucoma surgery, etc.
- Eyeglasses or contacts: Only if you've had cataract surgery.
- Medical eye exams: Only if you're having vision problems that indicate a serious eye condition like macular degeneration, retinopathy, glaucoma or dry eye syndrome.
- Glaucoma screenings: Annual screenings for those at high risk (have diabetes, a family history of glaucoma, are African-American or Hispanic).
- Diabetic eye exams: If you have diabetes, yearly exams for diabetic retinopathy.
- Macular degeneration: Certain treatments are covered.

You also need to be aware that of the eye care services that are covered by Medicare, you're still responsible for 20 percent of the cost—Medicare pays the other 80 percent. To help with this out-of-pocket expense, some Medigap supplemental policies provide gap coverage. Or, if you have Medicare Advantage, some plans provide eye care benefits. Be sure you check with your plan administrator.

### Ways to Save

If you find your eye care needs aren't covered, or you can't afford the 20 per-

cent out-of-pocket that Medicare doesn't cover, there are other ways to save. For starters, if you need a refractive eye exam or a new pair of eyeglasses, many optometrists and eyeglass dealers offer discounts—usually between 10 and 30 percent—to seniors who request it. Memberships in groups like AAA and AARP can also provide lower rates.

Another way to get low-cost eye care is at an optometry school. Many offer affordable care provided by students that are overseen by their professors. See [opted.org](http://opted.org) for a directory of schools and their contact information.


### Assistance Programs

Depending on where you live, there may also be some local clinics or charitable organizations that provide free or discounted eye care or eyeglasses. Put in a call to your local Lions Club to see what's available in your area. To reach your local club, visit [lionsclubs.org](http://lionsclubs.org) or call 800-747-4448 to get the number to your state Lions Club office, which can refer you to your community representative.

Or, if you need medical eye care, check into EyeCare America. This is a national program that provides comprehensive medical eye examinations to seniors age 65 and older, and up to one year of treatment at no cost. They accept Medicare or other insurance as full payment. And if you don't have insurance, care is free. To learn more or to find out if you qualify, visit [\[erica.org\]\(http://erica.org\).](http://eyecaream-</a></p></div><div data-bbox=)

If you're under age 65, some other services that can help include Mission Cataract USA ([missioncataractusa.org](http://missioncataractusa.org)), which provides free cataract surgery to low-income people who don't have insurance. Vision USA ([aoa.org/visionusa.xml](http://aoa.org/visionusa.xml), 800-766-4466), which provides free vision care to uninsured and low-income workers and their families. And the Knights Templar Eye Foundation (214-888-0220, [knightstemplar.org/ktef](http://knightstemplar.org/ktef)), which provides financial assistance for eye surgeries to low income people who don't have private insurance.

National Historical Park, the Museo Alameda, the San Antonio Museum of Art, the Witte Museum, the Texas Rangers Museum, the Buckhorn Museum, ArtPace, Blue Star Contemporary Art Center, the Texas Transportation Museum, and Splashtown San Antonio.

San Antonio claims to be the birthplace of the spicy stew known as chili. It was introduced to the nation when the city sent a San Antonio Chili stand to the 1893 Columbian Exposition in Chicago. San Antonio is also home to the Frito, the Cheeto, and Pace picante sauce.

Greater San Antonio is a HUGE Bingo center offering high stakes Bingo at many venues, including Southeast Bingo, Blanco Bingo, Megabucks Bingo, Randy's Bingo, Power Bingo, Jackpot Bingo, Northeast Bingo, Alamo Hills Bingo, Flamingo Bingo, Late Night Bingo and Golden Bingo to name but a few.



# Vegas Happennings

## Harmon Tower at CityCenter

■ **Judge rules the tower unsafe and to be demolished**

### Harmon Tower Unsafe

A District Court judge has ruled that the Harmon tower at CityCenter is unsafe and can be demolished. A pending lawsuit between MGM Resorts International and the project's general contractor, Tutor Perini, has blocked the demolition until now. Originally planned as a 48-story hotel/condominium, construction was halted at 26 stories in 2008 when structural defects were discovered. That lawsuit, which will determine who's responsible for more than \$400 million in damages, is set to begin in February. MRI says that it could take up to a year to complete the demolition and that it has not developed a plan for what it will do with the space.

### Parts of Linq Opens

The "High Roller" observation wheel that will be the key feature in the Linq development now has a prominent presence at center Strip. Though it looks only about half complete, it already extends well above The Quad, and at its eventual 550 feet will be one of the tallest structures in Las Vegas. Meanwhile, CET is seeking sponsorship for the wheel. The company says that interest in naming rights has already surfaced, but that it's being selective about picking the right partner. No information on the cost of putting a name on the big wheel was released. While portions of Linq are scheduled to open in December, the High Roller won't be completed until some time in 2014.

### The Gramercy

Work resumed on the former Manhattan West, a retail and residential development that halted construction in late 2008. Now under new management, the 20,000-square-foot project has been renamed The Gramercy. Located on Russell Rd., west of the 215, the residential component will feature a nine-story high rise with 85 apartments, along with a four-story mid-rise with 160 apartments.

### Vegas Extreme

An Australian entrepreneur wants to build a wakeboarding, snowboarding, surfing, and white-water rafting experience called Vegas Extreme in the vicinity of the Las Vegas Strip. The plan calls for a \$50 million 40-acre amusement park to spring up by the end of 2014. The fact that the entire budget might be required to buy just the land wasn't addressed in the announcement.

### Wildfire Anthem

As Dotty's goes big, Wildfire goes small. Following its purchase of The Lift, which has just opened as the Wildfire Valley View, Station Casinos has purchased the Doc Holliday's bar in the Anthem area of Henderson, which will also be converted to the brand. Whereas even the small Valley View venue has 35 machines, the Anthem location has a restricted gaming license that allows only 15, making it more of a Wildfire bar than a casino.




### **Lottery Scholarship Threatened**

A state task force has begun considering possible changes to keep New Mexico's lottery-funded college scholarship program from running short of money, *The Albuquerque Journal* has reported. New Mexico students qualify for a scholarship covering tuition by meeting certain enrollment criteria and academic achievements. Scholarship costs are growing faster than lottery revenue in part because of tuition increases, and Higher Education Secretary Jose Garcia says scholarships could be scaled back as soon as next year if legislators don't act in their next annual session. A task force of legislators and university officials has met twice to discuss the issue. A non-profit advocacy group recommended that the program be changed to provide assistance based on students' financial need.

### **Statewide Raffle**

The Arkansas Scholarship Lottery will roll out a new statewide raffle game with a top \$1 million prize and more than 40 new instant tickets in 2014. According to *Arkansas Online*, agency director Bishop Woosley said that the second Million Dollar Raffle will have some key differences from the first one in 2010, in which ticket sales started off slowly because a draw date wasn't set. Woosley said the agency

will also create 46 new instant ticket games in that span. Last year, 81 percent of sales were instant scratch-off tickets—which differ from online tickets like Powerball and Mega Millions. Woosley said the lottery's Natural State Jackpot proved successful in its first year. The agency projected \$6 million in sales after it debuted last August. By July 31, it had sold \$7,784,629 and awarded \$3,900,801 in prizes.

### **Settlement Between Hairstylists**

Seven hairstylists have reached a confidential settlement with a former co-worker to end a lawsuit over a \$9.5 million lottery jackpot. Defendant Christy Shaw told Indiana TV network WTHR-TV that everyone walked away with something. She claimed she bought the winning ticket separately from those purchased with pooled money. An Indianapolis judge issued a preliminary injunction barring the Hoosier Lottery from paying the jackpot until the dispute was resolved. The seven plaintiffs claimed everyone in the group agreed to share any winnings from tickets purchased at the same time as those for the pool. Shaw claimed no one ever told her of the unwritten rule.

### **Football in Florida unites with State Lottery**

#### **Lottery Logos**

*USA TODAY* has reported that two of Florida's long-time college football rivals came together in a new contest: to sell lottery tickets. The Florida Lottery paid hundreds of thousands of dollars so it could use the logos of the University of Florida and Florida State University on a \$2 scratch-off lottery game aimed squarely at football fans. The "\$50,000 Gridiron Cash" game not only featured cash prizes, but also gave ticket buyers a chance to win other prizes, including season tickets and even bowl tickets to games featuring the Gators or Seminoles. It's been routine for years to have the Florida Lottery advertise at football games and do promotional events with state colleges, *USA TODAY* noted. But paying to use the team logos on scratch-off tickets marks a major step up.



**Reno.** The name of the new slots-only casino replacing the former Silver Club in Sparks is Bourbon Square (not Bourbon Street, as we reported in July). This is the casino that was targeted for a “Beverly Hillbillies” theme that didn’t happen.

**Atlantic City.** While the casinos continue their ongoing losing streak in terms of negative year-over-year win comparisons, there was good news for Revel, which booked a 33% increase in July. The \$23.4 million win, which was the resort’s best month ever, is credited to the controversial loss-rebate deal that ran in that month. The same deal is also the subject of scattered complaints and even a lawsuit brought by customers who charge that the promotion was “deceptive.”

**New York.** Seneca Buffalo Creek Casino opened in Buffalo in August. The casino will eventually have 18 table games and 800 slots.

**Iowa.** A \$120 million land-based Hard Rock casino that’s being called a “game-changer” for the area will be built in Sioux City. The Hard Rock is replacing the Argosy gambling boat and is scheduled to open next summer.

**Oklahoma.** The South Wind Casino Kaw City has operated since April as a smokeless venue, the only one of the state’s more than 120 tribal casinos to be completely smoking free.

**Macau.** Caesars Entertainment is now officially out of the Macau market after selling its lone landholding there—a 175-acre parcel that was purchased in 2007 for \$578 million and slated to become a golf course. The sale price was \$438 million.

**Vietnam.** The Grand Ho Tram Strip has opened with 541 rooms, convention space, retail, three pools, a spa, a Greg Norman-designed golf course, 13 restaurants and bars, and a casino with slots and table games. Plans call for an expanded casino and the addition of four more large-scale luxury resorts.

**Online.** The big question is once again whether or not a federal bill governing online gambling will be passed before the states pass their own laws. Amid the uncertainty, two big players have entered the fray. Wynn Resorts, which formerly claimed to have no interest in the online space, and the massive Irish book-making company Paddy Power are both apparently looking to strike a deal with Revel or Atlantic Club, the two Atlantic City casinos yet to form affiliations with online partners.

**Sweet facts about sweet potatoes**

I'm often asked about the difference between sweet potatoes and yams. The sweet potato is not a potato or even a distant cousin. Potatoes are tubers; sweet potatoes are roots.

True yams (from tropical and subtropical regions of the world) contain more starch and less sugar than sweet potatoes—and they must be cooked before eating. African slaves in the South called the sweet potato “nyami” because it reminded them of the starchy, edible tuber of that name that grew in their homeland. The Senegalese word “nyami” was eventually shortened to “yam.”

When the orange-fleshed, Puerto Rican variety of sweet potatoes was adopted by Louisiana producers and shippers, they called them “yams” to distinguish them from the white-fleshed sweet potatoes grown in other parts of the country. The yam reference became the trademark for Louisiana-grown sweet potato, and refers to sweet potatoes that are grown in

Louisiana.

There is a difference between sweet potatoes grown in northern states and those grown in Louisiana. Sweet potatoes produced in the northern states are mostly “firm” and tend to be drier and more mealy with yellow flesh. Folks in Louisiana enjoy the second type, “soft,” which is higher in natural sugar. Louisiana sweet potatoes are moister, and have a bright-orange flesh color. Most often, it is the “soft” type that is referred to as a yam.

Sweet potatoes are stored in temperature- and humidity-controlled warehouses that extend their shelf life for the entire year. So the “season” for fresh yams is 12 months. Canned yams also are available year-round.

Here's some great information about the health benefits of sweet potatoes, and how to select, store and prepare them:

—Orange, leafy green and red fruits and veggies, such as sweet potatoes, are full of beta-carotene/vitamin A, which regulates cell production and turnover for a smooth skin surface.

—The CSPI ranked the sweet potato at 184 in nutritional value, more than 100 points ahead of a baked Idaho potato, spinach or broccoli.

—Sweet potatoes provide twice the recommended daily allowance of vitamin A and more than one-third of the daily requirements of vitamin C.

—Sweet potatoes are an important source of beta-carotene, vitamin B-6, iron, potassium and fiber. Sweet potatoes that are a pretty, bright-orange color are richest in beta-carotene.

—Studies have consistently shown that a high intake of beta-carotene-rich vegetables and fruits, like sweet potatoes, can sig-

nificantly reduce the risks for certain types of cancer.

—Sweet potatoes contain virtually no fat or sodium.

—When selecting fresh sweet potatoes, choose those that are smooth, plump, dry and clean.

—Sweet potatoes should not be refrigerated unless cooked. Store at 55 degrees to 65 degrees F.

—Always use a stainless-steel knife when cutting a sweet potato. Using a carbon blade will cause them to darken.

—One cup of canned sweet potatoes equals one medium-size, cooked fresh sweet potato.

—When using canned yams, add them at the end of the recipe because they are already pre-cooked.

This recipe for Vietnamese Sweet Potato and Pork Soup showcases the flavors of the sweet potato in a spicy, coconut-milk broth.

**VIETNAMESE SWEET POTATO AND PORK SOUP**

- 1 tablespoon canola oil
- 1 pound ground pork
- 1 small onion, finely chopped (about 1/2 cup)
- 1/4 cup chopped fresh basil, divided
- 1 (3-inch) piece lemongrass or zest of 1 lemon
- 3 cloves garlic, minced
- 1 jalapeno pepper, chopped
- 2 teaspoons grated fresh ginger
- 2 teaspoons ground cumin
- 1 1/2 teaspoons ground cardamom

- 1 teaspoon salt
  - 1 teaspoon ground black pepper
  - 1/4 teaspoon ground nutmeg
  - 2 sweet potatoes, peeled and cut into 1/2-inch cubes (about 2 cups)
  - 1 quart chicken stock
  - 1 (13.5-ounce) can light coconut milk
  - 1 tablespoon soy sauce
- Chopped fresh cilantro, basil or jalapeno pepper slices for garnish


1. In a large stockpot, heat oil over medium heat. Add pork, onion, 2 tablespoons basil, lemongrass or lemon zest, garlic, jalapeno, ginger, cumin, cardamom, salt, pepper and nutmeg. Cook until pork is browned and onion is soft, about 10 minutes.

2. Add sweet potatoes, chicken stock and coconut milk. Bring to a boil and then reduce heat to a simmer. Cover and cook until sweet potatoes are tender, about 20 minutes. Uncover, remove lemongrass (if used) and stir in soy sauce. Garnish with remaining cilantro, basil and jalapeno, if desired. Serves 4.

Dear Readers,

We at the *Bingo Bugle* were fascinated when we received this letter. Just imagine: A Bingo hall so fed up with the bad behavior of its players that it would actually have a month-long lockout as punishment!

We wanted to learn more. So we placed a call to AMVETS Post 66 to find out if this letter was accurate and learn more about the actions which led up to the Bingo shutdown.

According to Post Commander Tony Altieri, the reader's letter is true...to a degree. "We actually shut down for a month for several reasons," he explains, "to give our volunteers time for vacations, to reorganize and re-group, to get more volunteers to help, and to give everyone—

players and workers—a break." That said, Tony is quick to add that the AMVETS Post 66 Bingo players are a tough crowd. "We are at our wits end trying to keep them happy," he says. "They complain about everything—the games are too fast or too slow, the sound is too loud or too soft, the hall is too cold or too hot. Nothing is ever right. We decided that everyone needed to step away and then we'd come back together and see if we couldn't make the Bingo better for everybody."

With regard to your letter, Angry Patron, you acknowledge that the games were being closed for a month because of players' bad behavior, yet nowhere in your letter do you show any remorse or regret for this behavior. You seem to feel that the workers there should just suck it up and accept your abuse.

If you want this Bingo to keep going, you need to remember that it is a charity game run by volunteers. If the volunteers aren't there, the games will fold. And who wants to volunteer to be stressed out and yelled at for try-

ing to help out and do a good job?

To paraphrase the reader who sent in the email: Every Bingo hall does not need players who harass the workers and they should not have to shrug it off as part of the game.

If they get tired of the heat, they will get out of the kitchen, and lock the doors behind them permanently. —*Aunt Bingo*

## Eye care

### ■ Coverage and services for retirees

Dear Savvy Senior,

Does Medicare cover eye care? I had excellent vision insurance through my employer for many years but lost it when I retired, and now am confused as to what Medicare actually covers. What can you tell me?

*Living on a Budget*

Dear Living,

Many retirees are confused with what Medicare will and won't cover when it comes to eye care. Here's a breakdown of how Medicare handles different types of vision care services, along with some additional tips that can help you get affordable care when needed.

### Medicare Coverage

If you have original Medicare (Part A and B), it's important to know that "routine" vision care like eye exams, eye refractions, eyeglasses

or contact lenses are generally not covered. But, "medically necessary" eye care usually is. Here's a list of what is covered:

- Eye surgeries: Any surgical procedure that helps repair the function of the eye like cataract removal, cornea transplant, glaucoma surgery, etc.
- Eyeglasses or contacts: Only if you've had cataract surgery.
- Medical eye exams: Only if you're having vision problems that indicate a serious eye condition like macular degeneration, retinopathy, glaucoma or dry eye syndrome.
- Glaucoma screenings: Annual screenings for those at high risk (have diabetes, a family history of glaucoma, are African-American or Hispanic).
- Diabetic eye exams: If you have diabetes, yearly exams for diabetic retinopathy.
- Macular degeneration: Certain treatments are covered.

You also need to be aware that of the eye care services that are covered by Medicare, you're still responsible for 20 percent of the cost—Medicare pays the other 80 percent. To help with this out-of-pocket expense, some Medigap supplemental policies provide gap coverage. Or, if you have Medicare Advantage, some plans provide eye

care benefits. Be sure you check with your plan administrator.

### Ways to Save

If you find your eye care needs aren't covered, or you can't afford the 20 percent out-of-pocket that Medicare doesn't cover, there are other ways to save. For starters, if you need a refractive eye exam or a new pair of eyeglasses, many optometrists and eyeglass dealers offer discounts—usually between 10 and 30 percent—to seniors who request it. Memberships in groups like AAA and AARP can also provide lower rates.

Another way to get low-cost eye care is at an optometry school. Many offer affordable care provided by students that are overseen by their professors. See [opted.org](http://opted.org) for a directory of schools and their contact information.

### Assistance Programs

Depending on where you live, there may also be some local clinics or charitable organizations that provide free or discounted eye care or eyeglasses. Put in a call to your local Lions Club to see what's available in your area. To reach your local club, visit [lionsclubs.org](http://lionsclubs.org) or call 800-747-4448 to get the number to your state Lions Club office, which can refer you to your community representative.

Or, if you need medical eye care, check into EyeCare America. This is a national program that provides comprehensive medical eye examinations to seniors age 65 and older, and up to one year of treatment at no cost. They accept Medicare or other insurance as full payment. And if you don't have insurance, care is free. 




