

Special Meeting

Proposed Amendments to St. Mark's Constitution

The Congregation Council is recommending the ratification of four amendments to St. Mark's Constitution, and is calling a Special Meeting of the congregation immediately **preceding** the Annual Meeting on January 29, 2006 to approve these amendments. The amendments would accomplish the following:

Expand St. Mark's Executive Committee to include one additional individual from the Congregation Council to serve as a member-at-large

Extend the maximum consecutive years an officer of the congregation can serve from two to three years

Specify that St. Mark's Treasurer would only have a vote on Congregation Council if they are voted in as a member of Congregation Council

Require that St. Mark's congregational records remain with St. Mark's when a pastor departs (This amendment is required by the synod)

The Council is also recommending changes to St. Mark's By-Laws to conform to the proposed amendments. The full text of the Amendments and changes to By-laws has been mailed to every member. WHAT'S NEW WITH THE RENOVATION?

We are now at the construction period midpoint

and the good news is that Plant Construction is on schedule and has not encountered major unexpected conditions in the building. The contrac-



tors have made major progress in recent weeks:

- √ Completed center coring of the east and west walls.
- Proceeded with shotcrete work. The work crews continue to install steel reinforcing and apply concrete to the inside face of the exterior brick building and tower walls.
- Continued removal, where needed, of brick wythes to accommodate the shotcrete.
- Installed a new concrete beam at the east and west parapets to stiffen the walls and tie to gether the north and south walls.
- Improved the connections between the roof trusses and the supporting columns embedded in the masonry walls.
- Added wood blocking to the Heritage Hall and Worship Space floor structure.

The success of our "Forward in Faith" capital campaign has allowed St. Mark's to work closely with Plant and our architects at ELS to review the work scope and cost that we can accommodate within our available funding. The Renovation Commission is currently evaluating options for exterior code-required repairs, interior finishes and lighting.

Join SMART this January for a hearty start of the New Year. Schnitzelhaus is a typical-looking German or Austrian small restaurant, with 45 seats, The cuisine is straightforward Austrian-German —

the cook owner is from Vienna and Munich. Schnitzels come eight ways, about half with breaded pork and the other sans breading. Two good executions are the Jaegerschnitzel (\$12.75), in which an unbreaded cutlet is topped with mushroom



sauce, and Sardellenschnitzel (\$12.75), breaded and topped with a thin, pungent anchovy sauce. Prices are very affordable and vegetarian dishes are served as well. Make sure to enjoy the German beers on tap, like the smooth Spaten or the cedary Franziskaner Hefe Weissbier, which are especially good with the food's big flavors. December Letter from the Ilagans in Cambodia

About a year ago we left the US – and began this new chapter in our ministry in Asia. And now we are in our 11th month in Cambodia.

Hot and Dry, Hot and Wet, Cool and Dry Weather

After the hot, sweaty months of March to May, we welcomed the Cambodian rains in June. The rainy season starts late May until November. December has brought in cooler evenings and early mornings and only occasional rains.

Connie's Volunteer Work -- Teaching English to Church Staff

Connie is now beginning to get more practice in her Khmer language as she starts to teach English to staff of the Church of Christ Our Peace (CCOP), the international Anglican church we regularly attend since coming to Cambodia. Her students include a Khmer pastor and a project manager of a local NGO (non government organization doing social work).

Visits to Mondulkiri and Ratanakiri Projects

As part of my introduction to the ICC as an organization, we visited two area-based projects of ICC located in the provinces of Mondulkiri and Ratanakiri. Both of these projects target the needs of ethnic minorities who, as in most other developing countries, have been left out of the development process.

Both Mondulkiri and Ratanakiri share a border with Vietnam. It is also in these two provinces where Cambodia's ethnic minorities live. Cambodian ethnic minorities are among the "least served" peoples in the country, since most of them don't read and write; are dependent on primitive agriculture; are isolated with no access to health, education, or social work facilities..

Teaching Phnong Children How to Read and Write (Mondulkiri)

One of the most interesting parts of the visit to Mondulkiri was when we went one evening to observe a Phnong literacy class for Phnong children in one of the ethnic villages, around 40 minutes drive on rough road (muddy during the rainy season) from the provincial center. The project had developed the Phnong alphabet and beginner level books to be used in teaching the Phnong children how to read and write.

As the children arrived for class on the day we visited, it was humbling to see many who had walked perhaps for 30 minutes from their houses. That day they had gone out to help their parents look for food to eat. Their agriculture being weather-dependent, many times there is not enough food among the ethnic minority villages, and children have to work, too.

But despite the hard work they still came to review the lessons of the preceding night; recite and read from the old, dimly lit blackboard the teacher used; and battle the mosquitoes that kept on attacking them and us, too. At the end the Literacy Coordinator asked them some questions and gave out candies as they gave their answers to the questions. This made the session that night end on a happy note.

Water Filters and Adult Literacy Class in Ratanakiri

Good drinking water is a problem in the rural areas of Cambodia. In Ratanakiri we visited an ethnic community where ICC had introduced a simple, economical way of filtering water. The filter uses local materials. A village association was organized that handled the production and distribution of the water filters.

We also visited an "adult" literacy class in another ethnic village. Connie was surprised to see the students -- who were actually children who are too old for the regular school. Somehow because of poverty and isolation, these children had not had the chance to go to school.

Again, we thank all our friends and supporters. May God's grace and peace be with us all as we celebrate Christ's birth and welcome 2006.
