Help Your Child Get Ready to Read by increasing their vocabulary:

Reading together introduces your child to words that hey may not hear in everyday conversation.

As your child gets older check out Informational and non-fiction books as well. Non-story books offer even more vocabulary. Explore non-fiction books about chicks and bunnies such as: *Bunnies* by Grace Elora or the See How They Grow: Chicks and See How They Grow: Bunnies by Dorling Kindersley.



Fingerplays & Songs:

Little Bunny

There was a little bunny who lived in the wood. (hold up two fingers) He wiggled his ears as a good bunny should (wiggle on head) He hopped by a squirrel. He hopped by a tree. (hop, hop) He hopped by a duck. And he hopped by me. (hop, hop over fist) He stared at the squirrel. He stared at the tree. (stare, stare) He stared at the duck. But he made faces at me! (stare, make faces)



I saw a little rabbit go hop, hop, hop (bounce baby three times on your lap)
I saw his ears go flop, flop, flop (touch ears three times)
I saw his eyes go wink, wink, wink (touch eyes three times)
I saw his nose go twink, twink, twink (touch nose three times)
I said "Little rabbit, won't you stay?" (hug baby)
He looked at me and hopped away. (bounce baby as you say "hopped away")



Did You Ever See a Bunny?
