



Synopsis

Elijah Freeman is a young boy coming of age in Buxton, Canada – a settlement of former slaves who have established a free society just over the border in Ontario. Through Elijah's eyes, the reader is given a window into what life was like in the 1860's for newly freed people struggling to build lives, educate themselves, and survive in a world where prejudice is commonplace and nothing can be taken for granted.



Hooks

- Freedom is precious. In what ways do the residents of Buxton show that they appreciate their freedom?
- What does the preacher find so upsetting about the traveling carnival?
- What does Elijah's mother mean when she calls him fragile? Is being fragile a good thing, a bad thing, or both?
- In what ways is Elijah, who was born free, different from those who live in Buxton but were born slaves?
- Is it better to work hard and make your own decisions, or to be taken care of but live at someone else's whim, like MaWee?
- How far would you be willing to go to help a friend?

Meet the Author—Christopher Paul Curtis



Christopher Paul Curtis was born in 1953 in Flint, Michigan. For thirteen years he worked on an assembly line in a plant manufacturing cars, and during his breaks he would write. He also worked as a maintenance man, a purchasing clerk, a customer service representative, and other jobs, while going to school part-time. In 1993, he took a year off to write his first book, *The Watsons Go to Birmingham – 1963*, while his wife, a nurse, supported the family. He wrote in the Windsor Public library, the children's area, and hand wrote the novel. His son, Steven, typed out his father's writing. Since then, Curtis has been writing books that are lauded by award-givers and enjoyed by children. *Elijah of Buxton* (New York: Scholastic Press, 2007) has been recognized as an ALA Notable Book for Children 2008, Coretta Scott King Award 2008; Newbery Honor 2008; and Scott O'Dell Award for Historical Fiction 2008, among others. When Curtis is not writing laugh-outloud fiction, he enjoys playing basketball and collecting records.



Writing Prompts / Discussion Questions for *Elijah of Buxton*




- Elijah has a reputation of being "fra-gile." What are the characteristics of a fragile person? Does Elijah ever realize that he has outgrown his reputation?

Synopsis

Cracker is a German Shepherd owned by a 12-year-old boy named Willie. Willie's family is forced to move, and Willie is forced to give up Cracker. Cracker is given to the Army for training as a scout dog in Vietnam. Cracker is upset about losing her loving family, but grows to accept her situation as she develops a relationship with Rick, her handler.

Rick and Cracker are trained to work as a team, spotting dangerous booby traps and ambushes, and are eventually flown to Vietnam where they must lead units of troops through treacherous jungles, villages, and battlefields. This books tells of their tour of duty together. The reader learns about everything that makes Cracker the best dog in Vietnam.

- How does Rick earn Cracker's trust? How does Cracker earn Rick's?
- Is an animal's life as valuable as a human's life?
- Why does Rick develop such intense feeling for Cracker?
- Are there any good reasons to go to war? If so, what are they?
- Are any beliefs worth dying for? What would they be?
- How far would you go to help someone you love? How far would you go to help one of your pets?

In 1956, Cynthia Kadohata was born in Chicago to Japanese-American parents. She moved a great deal as a child, living in five different states. She attended college at the University of Southern California, earning a degree in journalism. She worked earnestly on her writing, attending graduate school and submitting 25 stories to the *New Yorker* before her first was accepted. She wrote three novels for adults before writing her first book for young adults. That book, *Kira-Kira*, won the Newbery Medal in 2004. She has written six books and many short stories for the *New Yorker*, *Grand Street*, *Ploughshares*, and the *Pennsylvanian Review*. Some of her favorite authors include Lois Lowry, Hilary McKay, and Linda Sue Park. *Cracker! The Best Dog in Vietnam* (New York: Antheneum, 2007) has been recognized as a Notable Social Science Trade Book 2008.

Writing Prompts / Discussion Questions Cracker: The Best Dog in Vietnam



- Willie knows that if he doesn't find someone to adopt Cracker, he will have to give her to the pound. Is the pound worse for Cracker than going to war? Is Cracker suited as a war dog?
- Why does Rick's father agree to sign the papers for him to join the army?
- Rick's parents taught him about fairness. How does basic training teach him about politics?
- What is the toughest lesson he learns in basic training?
- In the beginning, it is doubtful that Cracker is going to make it through training. At what point, then, does Rick realize that Cracker is going to become "the best dog in Vietnam"?
- Rick sees courage and also feels it. What might he say is the most courageous act he witnessed?
- Compare and contrast Cracker's relationship with Willie and Rick.

Synopsis

Skulduggery Pleasant is a wise-cracking detective who operates within a world of magic that coexists within our own. He also happens to be a long-dead skeleton who has stuck around to save the world from evil. In this book, he teams up with a twelve-year-old girl named Stephanie who has unsuspectingly inherited a powerful magic scepter.

The scepter is an ancient weapon that belongs to The Ancients, magical beings who existed at the beginning of time. The scepter was used to banish a group of evil beings called The Faceless Ones. In this novel, The Faceless Ones have re-emerged and are seeking the scepter. It is up to Skulduggery and Stephanie to foil their plans.



- Do you believe magic exists?
- Is it OK to lie to your family if you're doing so for a good reason?
- What are the qualities that Stephanie has that make her an ideal partner for Skulduggery? What qualities should a hero possess? Is Skulduggery a good hero?
- Stephanie fools her parents by creating a "double" of herself to stand in for her while she sneaks around with Skulduggery. If someone were to offer this option to you, would it be easy to fool your family? Would you try it?
- If you were to make a will, would there be anything special that you would leave to anyone in particular?
- Would you be willing to embark on an adventure, even if it meant risking your life?

Meet the Author—Derek Landy



Born in in 1973, Irish writer Derek Landy grew up on a farm pulling cauliflower and celery. As an adult he lives near Dublin, Ireland, but not too far from his parents' farm. Landy always wanted to write. As a child, he loved class assignments that called for writing stories. A fan of horror and fantasy movies, Landy became a screenwriter; he didn't expect to write a novel for young people. The character's name popped in his head and the book followed quickly. When not writing humorous, fantasy detective fiction, Landy collects comics. He is also a black belt in Kenpo Karate, which he taught to children for ten years. *Skulduggery Pleasant* (New York: HarperCollins, 2007) has been recognized as an ALA Best Book for Young Adults 2008 and an ALA Ten Best Books for Young Adults 2008. The first novel has spawned a series, with the first book renamed to *Scepter of the Ancients* to distinguish it from the later books, followed by *Playing with Fire* (2008), and *The Faceless Ones* (2009). The fourth book, *Dark Days*, was released April 1, 2010. He plans for the series to run nine books. The movie rights for *Skulduggery Pleasant: Playing with Fire* have been purchased by Warner Brothers, for a possible release in 2011.

- What is the cruelest part of Skulduggery Pleasant? What is the most hopeful part of Skulduggery Pleasant?
- What part of the story would you change, if you were the author?
- Like many books, Skulduggery Pleasant may become a movie. If you were in charge of casting the movie, which actors would you cast?
