A Dream Come True

On Sunday, November 13, 2005, multi-colored balloons waved in the autumn air, welcoming visitors up the steps of Caroline House to the 10th Anniversary Celebration and Dedication. People from all walks of life came streaming through the door, arms laden with pocket breads, twists, puddings, fruit, cheeses, guava jelly, shrimp, crab, pork, quiches, candy, and dozens of other delicacies. Among the crowd of 200 people were members of the Board of Directors, School Sisters, volunteers, students, past and present, families, children, Stillman Street neighbors, and good friends. The diversity was a testimony to the history and legacy of Caroline House as a place of comfort and learning for all women and children. Our cup of joy was overflowing.



Sister Ann Moles, SSND, new Executive Director, remarked, "I never dreamed I would be standing here inside Caroline House...I remember when Alice Simon entrusted the house to the School Sisters. I think she is proud of our accomplishments." Aline Couture, Chairperson of the Board of Directors, awarded an honorary plaque for service to Caroline House and yellow rose corsages to S. Mary Lennon, S. Karen Kane, S. Maureen Fleming, and S. Brenda Lynch.



Sister Bernadine spoke eloquently of the simple beginnings of Caroline House -- the years of struggle to recruit the first ten students and to gain recognition as a learning center for English as a Second Language.

S. Bernadine recalled, "We spoke to teachers, school nurses, and social workers to let them know we existed, that our program was for women, and that we were School Sisters of Notre Dame." As the program grew from a mere 10 students to almost 100 today, she smiled warmly. "We saw the changes in the women, the increase in their self-confidence, the pride in their accomplishments...then we added the childcare program and classes in computer education, health, finance, and much more." The Caroline House graduates smiled proudly as S. Bernadine spoke about how their dreams came true.



On the third floor, guests stood close together to hear Monsignor Genuario dedicate the classroom in loving memory of Anita Hampel Hyland, a beloved volunteer who gave time and talent to Caroline House. Visitors continued to tour the many areas of Caroline House—computer labs, classrooms, and the colorful Children's Program areas, such as the new Language & Literacy room. Many remarked, "This is really a beautiful home! And much larger than one would think."

Thank you to everyone who came to celebrate and to those who sent their good wishes. Your blessings and support will carry us forward to meet the literacy challenges of the next decade. Caroline House is committed to the Greater Bridgeport community and to its mission outreach for women and their children "to reach the fullness of their potential through education."

A Woman's Perspective

A DONDE VA EL DINERO? WHERE DOES THE MONEY GO? Any woman managing a household budget often asks, “Where does it go? How can I save? To help women learn about finance, The Life Skills Program at Caroline House offers a unique course in financial literacy. The facilitators are members of *Women's Advantage*, an international non-profit organization that educates women from all walks of life and economic strata to their personal economic power. This 4-part series helps women



to clarify economic concepts, such as interest, credit and debit. Each woman receives a binder in which to log her budget information and tips for managing household finances.


In September 2005, we began a program of individualized attention for our children. The Director selects one child to work with one university tutor volunteer. They spend special time in the new literacy area.
