Sex Trade

Sex Trade Recruiters & Pimp Violence

This report examines how young girls are recruited into the sex trade in the Chicago metropolitan area, including strategies used, and levels of coercion, control and violence that hold them in prostitution.¹

The report examined 100 young women between the ages of 16 and 25 who reported being involved in the Chicago sex trade. The average age of entry was 16 years old although 1/3 of the sample entered between 12-15. Runaways, low-income/poor, victims of abandonment, childhood sexual assault, homelessness, foster care or young women from group homes. Finally, there was a correlation between increased number of customers and increased levels of violence from the period of recruitment.

Community Harassment

These results are from the Rogers Park Young Women's Action Team: Street Harassment Survey Summary Report, who surveyed 168 young women about street harassment and safety in Rogers Park. ⁴

Street Harassment

DEMOGRAPHIC PROFILE OF RESPONDENTS

22.6% were between the ages of 10 and 13; 36% were between the ages of 14 to 16; 25% were between the ages of 17 and 19.

55% were African-American/Black; 22% were Latina/Chicana/Hispanic; 10% were Asian-American; 5.4% were White/Caucasian.

The majority of respondents (n=168) attended the following schools:

- 86% said that they had been catcalled (for example: Hey baby! Hey beautiful!) on the street.
- 58% said men or boys on the street had harassed them.
- 36% of those respondents who had been harassed suggested that this happened once a day or more.
- 54% said that they never responded to the catcaller or harasser.
- 53% felt like they could not do anything to stop street harassment.
- 60% felt unsafe walking around in Rogers Park.
- 61% of those who felt unsafe were most uncomfortable at night (8 p.m. to midnight).
- 81% deemed either Howard Street or Morse Ave as the most unsafe streets in Rogers Park.

Domestic Violence/ Teen Dating Violence

The following data are from the Rogers Park Young Women's Action Team Report on Domestic Violence ⁵⁸

- > 11.1% of our respondents said they have been in an abusive/violent relationship.
- ➤ 4.8% said that they were not sure.
- ➤ 12% of students in Chicago had been hit, slapped or physically hurt on purpose by their boyfriend or girlfriend in the previous year.
 - o There are over 100,000 young people who attend Chicago Public High Schools. That means that there are at least 12,000 teens who have been physically abused by a dating partner.
- > 79% of our survey respondents said that they believed that dating violence is a big is a big issue among teens.
- ➤ 62.1% of teens said that they knew other teens who are or have been in an abusive/violent relationship.
 - Of these, 88% said that they knew between 1-5 teens who are or had been abused
 - o 7.7% said that they knew between 5-10 teens in this predicament
 - o 4.4% knew over 10 teens in this situation
- ➤ 84.1% said they themselves had never been in an abusive/violent relationship.
 - o Emotional/ Verbal Abuse:
 - 42% think that yelling at someone is NOT an example of violence.
 - 74% of our respondents think that ignoring someone is NOT a form of violence
- > 70% of our respondents think that pushing someone, grabbing someone, trying keep someone from seeing friends or family are examples of violence.
- > "Sometimes it is hard to tell when you are in an abusive relationship"
 - o 46% of teens agreed
 - o 43% disagreed
- ➤ 69% of teens said they probably would or definitely would break up with their partner is he/she were ever to grab, shove, slab, or punch them.
- > 81% teens felt that they probably or definitely would talk to a friend about it.
 - o 39% of teens surveyed would talk to family members about being abused
 - o 57% teens probably or definitely wouldn't talk to them
 - o 19% probably or definitely would talk to teacher, pastor or counselor if they were being abused.

 - o 12% probably
 - o 24% would probably or definitely turn to the courts
 - o 28% would probably or definitely call the police.
- > Teens would fight back and take matters into their own hands if they were being abused.
- > 74% of our respondents said that they probably or definitely would grab, slap, or punch the person back
- > 52% of teens said that they would get a friend/ family member to grab, slap or punch their abuser back.

- > 54% of teens believe that "if someone is being abused, it is not his/her fault"
- ➤ Most teens identify "REAL" violence as physical violence as opposed to emotional abuse.
- A majority of teens (69%) said that they probably would or definitely would break up with their partner if he/she were ever to grab, shove, slap, or punch them
- ➤ 74% of our respondents said they would probably or definitely grab, slap, or punch the person back. 52% would get a family member to do this.

- > 81% said that they probably or definitely would talk to a friend about the abuse.
- > 39% of teens that we surveyed would talk to a family member about being abused.
- > 19% would probably or definitely talk to a teacher, pastor, or counselor if they were being abused
- > 12% probably or definitely would call a dating/domestic violence hotline for advice.
- Most teens that we surveyed didn't know of many places for teens who are in abusive relationships to get help.

Facts about teen relationship violence/abuse

- One in five high school girls has been physically or sexually abused by a dating partner.
- o These girls are at higher risk for substance abuse, suicide, risky sexual behavior, pregnancy, and suicide attempts.1
- Estimates of the prevalence of teen dating violence range from 9 to 60 percent, including verbal, physical, and sexual violence. Female teens cause more minor injuries than male teens, but are also likely to receive more significant physical injuries and are more likely to be sexually victimized.2
- o A study of teen mothers on welfare in Chicago found that 49% of the young women had experienced some level of domestic violence from their boyfriends in the last 12 months.
- o Furthermore, 48% reported birth control sabotage, and 21% experienced work or school related sabotage.
- Research is mixed on the influence of witnessing parental domestic violence on teens' use of violence in their intimate relationships. Youth who grow up witnessing domestic violence are more at risk for relationship abuse, but that history is not the only explanation.
- o Eight percent of high school girls said "yes" when asked if "a boyfriend or date have ever forced sex against your will."
- o 77% of completed rapes are committed by someone known to the victim.
- o About 44% of rape victims are under age 18. Three out of every 20 victims (15%) are under age 12.7 Only 6 percent of girls and 11% of boys experiencing severe abuse tell an authority figure.

Research Objectives

- How do girls define safety?
- What do they consider safe and unsafe situations?
- How doe feeling unsafe impact girls' quality of life?
- What strategies do girls use to cope with physically and emotionally unsafe situations?

Quantitative and Qualitative Research

- A national sample of 2,270 girls ages 8 17 took an online survey in April 2003.
- Sixty-two girls from four target cities across the country participated in agespecific focus groups in May, 2003.

The Hidden Costs

- Girls who do not feel safe are more likely than girls who feel safe to:
 - o Feel unhappy
 - o Have trouble paying attention in school
 - o Get poorer grades
 - o Feel that there is no one to talk to
 - o Have trouble making decisions
 - o Worry about finding peers and adults they can talk to and trust.

Girls who do feel safe are more likely to:

- Have at least three supportive adults in their lives they can turn to when needed
- o Get along well with their parents
- o Feel they can do anything if they try hard enough
- o Have lots of friends

Girls Feel Unsafe in Everyday Situations

- 38% of girls consider speaking and participating in class and spending time with people their own age a threat to their emotional safety.
- 34% of girls consider participating in groups with their peers a threat to their emotional safety
- More teens (45%) than preteens 32%) worry about their emotional safety while speaking or participating in class.
