

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## St. Paul's Family and Friends Work Together in Community to Share God's Blessings Worldwide

More than **400 volunteers** from St. Paul's United and a variety of other groups **packaged 120,212 meals** for Stop Hunger Now on St. Paul's Mitzvah Day 2013. That far surpassed the 74,406 meals packed during the church's first Stop Hunger Now event in 2011.

Fondren Hall was packed with people of all ages — from toddlers in arms to octogenarians — working side by side toward a common goal. These Stop Hunger Now (SHN) meals comprised of vitamins, dehydrated vegetables, soy product, and rice are shipped to the most destitute places in the world.

The SHN Community Development Director for Houston, Pierce Stewart, explained that the organization is closely tied with education, shipping direct to schools and orphanages. When this food is provided at a school, he said, families do not have to decide between education and food.

"We have found that the education retention rate increases where these meals are provided," he said. "An educated community enlivens a community; the educated can — and do — 'pay back.'"

## More St. Paul's Mission Opportunities

On Mitzvah Day, we talked about what a gift it is to serve together and work for justice in our world. Many opportunities are available all the time, but we are focusing in on three current needs.

**First:** Rutabaga After-School Program is a free program for elementary students. The purpose of the program is to help the children with their homework as well as support and nurture the children in their physical, emotional, social and spiritual development.

Volunteers are needed for weekly homework help and support from 3 to 5:30 p.m. (or part of that time). At this time, we are also searching for people who want to support our kids in this program but are not able to commit to weekly tutoring. These volunteers will be a cheerleading/support team for the program and will be called upon for things like field trips, parties, and other special events.

# The Process

## Stage 1

Bags or boxes of three different foodstuffs — rice, soy, dehydrated vegetables — plus vitamins are unloaded and contents delivered to each table.



## Stage 2

Individuals funnel these foods into bags. When reconstituted with hot water, the contents equal six nutritiously balanced meals.



## Stage 3

Runners take the filled bags to the Weigh-and-Seal stations.

## Stage 4

Individuals weigh the bags, adjusting as necessary by taking out or adding rice; others seal the bags.



## Stages 5 and 6

More runners take the sealed bags to a Stop Hunger Now Bingo-card-like chart for accurate count. Others pack them into boxes, ready for shipping.

## Stage 7

Boxes are tallied and loaded onto a truck.

The children in Childcare bagged rice and beans for distribution to clients of the Emergency Aid Coalition and made "care packages" for children waiting with their parents at SEARCH.

# Thanks to Many, Abraham Station Renovations Serve Many More

St. Paul's has had an after-school program as part of its ministry in the community for many years. The program has evolved in a variety of ways and now serves a community of immigrant families, offering them after-school care and tutoring, with a particular concern for supporting second-language learners. It operates five days a week during the school year plus four weeks of summer camp.

As Rev. Nataly Negrete Lopez, the former after-school program director, began getting to know the families and the needs of the children and parents, a new community began to form. We began offering ESL, Bible studies, parenting classes, social events, and worship services for the families of the children. We have continued to grow and now meet twice



weekly for activities with this new community, now called *Fe y Esperanza* (Faith and Hope).

Great energy and enthusiasm are developing around these ministries, and having a space of hospitality to welcome and grow with our brothers and sisters is important. The recent renovations to Abraham Station provide such a space.

Some highlights:

- The new kitchen is twice the size of the previous one, providing more room for a cooking camp in the summer and community meals throughout the year.
- An additional classroom is now available.
- The updated foyer is being used to host Tuesday Tea

- A College and Career Room is open to all St. Paul's youth and is equipped with study and college preparation materials.
- The Emergency Aid Coalition has a new storage space.



Many volunteers and groups supported this project through their time and gifts. Thank you to the Young Adults, Trustees, St. Paul's Foundation, Mission Council, Parlor Committee, and the St. Paul's Maintenance Staff. Most of the work was done in-house and we are grateful for this group of talented folks!
