He spent the next two years in the sales office but left because he wanted, and he's being very candid here, more money and a nice car! To get these things he joined Rank Xerox for a year selling copier machines, and then to Gestetner selling small printing machines also for a year. The lure of paper however proved too much and he applied for jobs with Ross Paper, James McNaughton and Brands eventually striking lucky getting an outside sales job at Benjamin Gough in Sheffield. He stayed at Goughs for just over 3 years before joining Rothera & Brereton in 1985, also in Sheffield.

There was no doubt about it that our man was on his way, as his first Directorship came just before his 26th birthday and within 2 years his big chance came along when he opened a new branch for Rothera & Brereton, a greenfield site in Nottingham. The plan he tells us, was to do £5M in 5 years. He can't remember if he did that but £7M in 7 years was achieved. He must have been noticed as he was asked to join Masons Paper in East Anglia in 1997 as Managing Director. In 2001 he was also appointed Southern Area Director for Bunzl Fine Paper and went through the process of selling the business to Paperlinx . His final move was to Howard Smith Paper Group as Managing Director in 2004.

In 2007 he was invited to put his name forward to become a Liveryman of the Worshipful Company of Stationers and was "cloathed" in April 2008. He believes this to be a very special privilege as to his mind there is no finer city in the world than London. There are many of us who will concur with that emotion I am sure.

Malcolm married Loma in 1982 and they have a 17 year old son Cameron who will be attending the University of York in October to read History. The family home is in a small village in Cambridgeshire where they live with a Great Dane called Oscar (how Wilde is that?) and a short haired English Blue cat. He admits to an interest in things mechanical, particularly those with engines such as fast cars, motorbikes even powered lawnmowers and, (and this entirely in his own words) a

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motorcycle gang called the Bear Club which was formed from several colleagues who meet at breakfast times on Sundays when the weather is fine. His other interests includes Victoriana and clay pigeon shooting. So here we have it. A man of very considerable achievements and many of them during times that were full of change and difficulty within our industry. A steady hand at the tiller I

think and we wish him well and I ask the Members to give Malcolm our very best support during his year of office.

NORTON FISHERY – Thursday 12th November 2009

A lovely clear morning greeted us on our arrival at Norton Fishery near Abridge, Essex, the first time that PICT members had fished this particular lake. It is a 5 acre lake with excellent casting platforms giving good access to the water that is between 12' and 15' deep, giving plenty of room for fish to hide in.

It had taken quite a lot of chasing and cajoling in the lead up to the event but eventually we ended up with a total of 7 members and 3 guests and were also pleased to receive a visit from Peter Bothwick, our President.

I left my son and a friend to tackle up and made my way to join the 3 early starters including Robert Taylor who reported that he had had a take but not connected with a fish. I took up station next to him, cast out and low and behold struck into a fish on my first retrieve, so

that by the time my guests arrived my rod was bending satisfactorily.

The remaining members arriving later joined in the fray but it was clear that the quick start was not indicative of an easy day and although most people managed to get a fish by lunchtime it was not at all simple.

Peter Bothwick joined us mid morning and we stood chatting while I tried for my second fish. Eventually I hooked one to great relief only for it to throw the hook after a

spirited fight. It was time for sustenance.

The weather was so mild that we were able to sit out at the many bench seats, to enjoy our sandwiches or in the case of David Gould, the inevitable pork pie and Worcestershire sauce. It appeared that this also appealed to one of the Muscovy ducks and it would certainly have been easier if we had been duck hunting rather than fishing – the ducks came to hand more readily !

The President had very

kindly brought a bottle of wine that I decided should go to the angler catching the largest fish of the morning and so it was duly presented to Granville Ainley, one of our regular guests. To rub salt in the wound Granville went on to catch an even bigger one after lunch, about 3 ¾ lbs in a catch of 4 fish.

With clouds gathering and the light dimming, we fished on with 3 fish each for Glen Jenner, Sandy White and my son. Did I catch any more? Of course not!

Nevertheless a good day was enjoyed by all even though Norton Fishery is perhaps just a little noisy to be perfect, unless of course you enjoy helicopters which are serviced close by!

This marks the end of the 2009 season that has seen us fish still waters in Surrey and Essex plus the River Test. We welcome new faces to any of our events and if anyone is interested in giving the sport of fly-fishing a try, please contact me. Tuition and rod hire are always available so even if you have never fished before, why not give it a go?

FRENSHAM LAKES Thurs, 25th March
A rather disappointing turn out for the first outing of the year, saw just 6 members and 3 guests on the rather boggy banks of Frensham Lakes near Hindhead, Surrey. The recent rains had filled the six small lakes and created a good flow of water in the stream feeding them.

Surprisingly the morning weather was really quite pleasant and the fishing matched it for most anglers, with fish being caught regularly in all parts of the venue. As is so often the case it was the guests that showed us the way with each of them catching seven or more Rainbow Trout, most of which were returned. A picnic lunch was enjoyed in the comfort of the new fishing hut during which time the heavens opened on us but rather conveniently slackened to a drizzle in the afternoon. This may have had an effect on the fish because it became much harder after lunch. Most of us packed up mid afternoon after a really good day with the heaviest bag going to Gerry Overy with three fish weighing a total of 10lbs. He always seems to pull out big fish but on this occasion the biggest fish of the day was caught by a guest Roy Burgess at 6lb 8oz. After this opening meeting the top



OPEN DAY AT THE PAPER TRAIL

- 19th March 2010

Evelyn and I were very pleased to be invited to this open day at Apsley to look, listen and learn about what had been achieved over the 10 years of the existence of The Paper Trail. It was also an excuse for us to clamber aboard our tiny Morgan 4/4 to give it a bit of exercise before the summer runs begin, so for us, despite the wet weather, the day started with a hint of adventure in the air.



The Paper Trail is a charitable Trust begun in year 2000 under the guidance and energy of Peter Ingram, Chairman of Trustees, recently awarded the MBE for his achievements within the paper industry, and particularly for his work at The Paper Trail. His work and that of his staff has been truly prodigious. The charity exists primarily to educate those of all ages with particular efforts aimed towards the young, and to promote our industry, an action that has been woefully lacking over the past 2 - 3 decades. Peter and his team are doing so much to dispel the wrongfully held view that paper making and the use of paper

is “un-environmental, polluting and wasteful of scarce world resources” when the reverse is so patently true. It is just so good to see this group of right minded, enthusiastic people getting together and doing something to change a negative image of our industry that has been allowed to develop and better still, to gain recognition at the very highest level with the award of this prestigious medal. The day itself was superbly organised from start to finish. About 100 people came, mostly I must guess local to the area, though I understand a few of us crossed the Thames!



It began with Jacky Bennett, Chief Executive, giving us a brief history of the Frogmore Mill, site of the first mechanical paper mill in the world with its revolutionary Fourdrinier paper machine of circa 1810. Then, down the road apiece as they say, are the offices in John Dickinson’s “Cottage” on the site of the huge factory complex that I and many others must remember from the halcyon days of JD’s, now a mass of attractive housing on the Grand Union Canal. Jacky went on to describe how The Paper Trail was formed and how in 2002

it took over the old British Paper Mill at Frogmore and raised £7million to build a centre of excellence to retain papermaking and ancillary skills, and, of course, to educate. She told us that 2008 was the charity’s annus horribilis when funding ceased and they found themselves, to put it mildly, in great difficulty but currently things are better and despite being strapped for funding for certain projects, are looking with some optimism to the future.

Mike Penning, the local MP, recently back from Afghanistan made the telling point based on the British Army’s regimental system where a proper understanding of the past makes for an ethos on which operational success can be based. This is certainly the case at the Paper Trail where history seems to make the future. His was a very upbeat and impassioned address stressing how important such initiatives are to local communities as well as spinning off into Industry.

John Watson, General Manager, gave a most informative address, thanking donors past and present for their support. He described The Paper Trail’s list of activities which are just so many and where a visit to their website tells all. Peter Ingram described the importance of The Paper Trail operation, how support was garnered both locally and from the wider Industry. He stressed how the paper industry has historically not presented itself well to the

public and media and not defended itself from its detractors, insufficiently promoting its benefits and its sustainability. He was very determined to define the future of the charity, for it to be useful, attractive and interesting to all involved.

There then followed a short but fascinating video of Peter receiving his MBE at Buck House from the Prince of Wales resplendent in an admiral's uniform. (the Prince not Peter!)
