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Upcoming Programs

Out of that meeting, and several other regular meetings, have come many innovative new ideas which the Board is going to implement in order to make the Museum and Society more available to the citizens of Waukegan and especially the young people who visit us. With the help of our new Museum Supervisor, Ty Rohrer, we are making physical changes in the period rooms as well as changing the way the visitors can interact with the displays. We are trying to allow visitors farther into the rooms and having items all over the building that our younger visitors can actually pick up and touch.

It has been recognized by the Board that while the period rooms are beautifully restored and are a credit to the Historical Society and the Park

District's hard work, there needs to be more displays showing the history of Waukegan and the many groups which have contributed to our rich history. We are going try to improve our displays showing that history and the various waves of immigrants who have contributed to the building of Waukegan.

The Waukegan Historical Society is the repository of our area's history and many of the groups of immigrants who made this city are now moving away or dying. All of our members need to look in their personal collections as well as their ethnic, religious, and civic groups and ask the question "when I die where is this information going to go?" The answer to that question should be simple. It should go to the Waukegan Historical Society so that it will be available to future generations.

We have been so very pleased with the positive response that has been received about the Waukegan calendar that was sent to all of our members. We are looking into the possibility of doing this again next year as a special benefit to our members.

Upcoming Exhibits

We have two new exhibits opening within the next few weeks. We will be adding to our permanent exhibit of American Legion and Grand Army of the Republic items in an exhibit opening at the end of February and scheduled through the end of the year. This exhibit will be in the Tower Exhibit space at the top of the main staircase.



An exhibit on various forms of communications from radios and phonographs through typewriters and business machines will open at the end of March in the main exhibit space on the second floor. Some of these items were actually made right in Waukegan and will be brought out of our storerooms for the first time in years.

We have decided that our Treasures from the Collections exhibit would be more appropriately scheduled for 2008 which is the 40th Anniversary of the Historical Society so we will have more time to go through the storerooms and our attics to find more treasures.

New Awards Program

James W. Dorsey History Prize

The Waukegan Historical Society announces the inauguration of the James W. Dorsey History Prize for Waukegan High School students who produce the best entry on local history in the Chicago Metro History Fair. Each year a prize of \$500 will be presented to the winning team as judged by a representative from the Historical Society and from the High School.

James W. Dorsey taught at North Chicago High School and College of Lake County. Dr. Dorsey was an avid researcher into local history, especially the history of African Americans. He was a supporter of the Waukegan Historical Society, lectured widely throughout Lake County, and participated in the Oakwood Cemetery Walk for many years.

Historically Speaking The Bank at 1 S. Genesee Street

An 1859 business directory for Waukegan lists grocers and wagon makers, lawyers and tailors; the necessities of a small city. All of those specific businesses have disappeared over time. However, one listing, through several name changes, has continued to serve the community to today — the Bank of Northern Illinois.

In 1852 Charles & Ransom Steele opened a bank bearing their names. Five years later it merged with the Bank of Northern Illinois and operated as such until 1861 when Charles Steele purchased the entirety of the company and brought back the name of C.R. & R. Steele, Bankers.

Following the passage of the National Banking Act, our bank applied for and received a national charter and began operating as the First National

Bank of Waukegan on April 17, 1865. That was immediately after the end of the Civil War and the assassination of President Lincoln.



Initially located on Washington Street, about one building east of Genesee, the bank took its present site at 1 S. Genesee in the 1920s. Hoggson Brothers designed a stone-clad building in Classical Revival Style. Tall fluted pilasters are between the banks of windows and an eagle with spread wings is centered over the main entrance.

Inside the building are marble columns and counters. Plaster pilasters and cornice are included, along with a huge skylight. A stairway in the lobby leads down to the vault, with its round door behind an iron security screen. The beauty of the building caused it to be included in the Historical Society's 2005 Tour of Homes.

The name Bank of Northern Illinois reappeared in recent years, along with State Financial Bank. Today's Associated Bank is yet another title for Lake County's oldest bank and Waukegan's oldest continuing business. At the time of this writing Landmark Status is being sought to commemorate this building historically and architecturally significant.

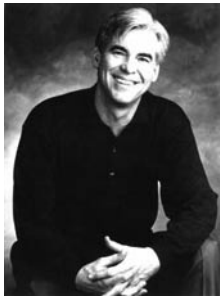

Dining Room Table

I was surprised at how much positive feedback I received from my small article on the dining room sideboard in the last newsletter, so here we go again. After the dining room in the Museum had been finished with its beautiful "Gone with the Wind" draperies, dark green carpet, and the beautiful sideboard had been placed on the south wall, we knew we had to find a table. As a part time antique dealer I had been looking for something appropriate and asking our members if anyone knew where we could find a table which could hold its own in such a fancy room. No one came forward until board member Sara Griffin reminded me that I had bought a table several years before at an antique fair. I had put this beautiful, wreck of a table in storage until I could have it restored to use in my dining room. In the meantime, my mother had moved in with me and had installed her fine early 19th century table in my dining room.

The table I had stored away is a Renaissance Revival banquet table from the period of about 1865 to 1880 in solid walnut with burl walnut veneers applied on the legs and table skirt. Unfortunately, the table had seen better days and had none of its original leaves. Sara convinced me to sell the table for what I paid, and the Board voted to have it restored and have leaves made. My wonderful furniture restorer took the table and worked his magic. The table is beautiful and the leaves match perfectly along with their burl veneers on the skirts. When it was finished we bought new white porcelain and brass casters just like it had when it was new and placed it in its prominent position in the dining room. The table is exactly what would have been in a high end dining room in the 1870s.

After the table was installed we put the word out for chairs and Randy Bowcott donated four Empire side chairs from his attic and I donated another pair

which are almost identical to the others. These four chairs were restored and we covered the seats in dark green velvet and placed them around the table. The chairs are of the Empire period of 1815 through 1845, so they combine with the later table just as they would in a normal home.

There is another piece in the dining room which we have recently acquired which I will discuss in the next newsletter — a beautiful empire game or card table.
