Corner of Genesee and Madison Streets

The proprietor would inform the friends of the house and the public generally, that they have refitted and refurnished the Waukegan House throughout, and are prepared to accommodate all those who may favor them with a call, in good and comfortable style. The tables will be furnished with all the delicacies that the market affords. We would like to say to the farmers that they can be accommodated at the following prices:

Dinner and horses to hay in barn, - \$.25

Supper, bed, breakfast, and horse to hay, - \$1.00

Guests conveyed to and from the cars free. - Please give us a call.

Historian Ed Link will discuss important historical events in Waukegan in the late 1800s and early 1900s as recorded in the diaries of veteran newspaperman Hobart Yard. Yard was born in Waukegan in 1864 and spent his career as a stringer (independent reporter) for many Waukegan and Lake County papers. His diaries, spanning the years 1875 to 1943, were recently donated to the Waukegan Historical Society. Of particular interest are the diaries covering the 1890s, for which no newspapers survive. Learn about some of Waukegan's most important events as seen through the eyes of this prolific and colorful reporter. Admission is free, refreshments will be served. # Exhibits!

#### Genesee Street: Through the Years

Whether you come to downtown Waukegan to shop, eat, work, or play Genesee Street has always been the place to be! Genesee grew up as the 'pulse' of Waukegan, from the vaudeville stage to the trolley system that started the North Shore Line. A special feature of the exhibit will be several fragments from the Academy Theatre, demolished in 2004.

#### Lost Treasure: The Simmons-Cooke House

The recent demolition of the historic Simmons-Cooke house at 104 S. Martin Luther King Jr. Avenue was a devastating blow to Waukegan. The beautiful Greek Revival structure was among the very oldest buildings in the city, and predated the founding of the City of Waukegan. This exhibit traces the history of three generations of the Simmons and Cooke families, and their impact on Waukegan and Lake County. In addition, the fifty year occupancy of the building by the Quietdale Funeral Home is explored, along with an in depth look at the efforts of the Historic Preservation Commission over the past year to save this important part of our local heritage. Fragments salvaged during demolition will be on display. Through December 2005.



## The Paper Clip: A Victorian Invention

It is generally believed that the first known fastening of papers started in the 13th century when a short length of ribbon was placed through parallel incisions in the upper left hand corner of pages. This was followed by a seal-method, the act of connecting papers with wax and textile ribbons. Almost 600 years passed before any serious attempt was made to improve the ribbon fastener. Come view our small exhibit unraveling the twisted history of the paper clip.

#### **HORSES**

In our modern, urban community we often forget that this was once an agricultural area. The early settlers came here for a variety of reasons, including good farm land and a lake which allowed easier transportation of their goods. Among the many agricultural pursuits, an important one was the care and raising of horses.

Obviously horses were the primary mode of transportation and power prior to the automotive age. But their influence was very wide-spread and extended even after the arrival of cars.

Waukegan had a fair grounds; 30 acres roughly bounded by Park, Jackson, Clayton and Washington streets. It contained a half-mile oval race track, where trotting races had prizes as high as \$150. Those events ended in the mid-1880s.

Raeside Bros. imported and bred Clydesdale horses and Shetland ponies. They were large enough to advertise in a national farm paper in 1888.

To secure these large investments, the Waukegan Horse Owners' Protective Association existed in 1889. They used members' dues to recover stolen horses and to prosecute thieves.

As late as 1917, the Prairie Farmer's Directory of Lake County listed four horse shoers, two blacksmiths and one harness maker - all within the city limits.


Horses were also used for many delivery services. There was a horse-drawn bus from the railroad station to the Waukegan House at Genesee and Madison. The dairies had home deliveries and the horses probably knew the routes better than the drivers. These routes lasted until 1949. While the fire department became mechanized in 1911, their records show that the fire horses continued to be exercised until at least 1919. The last horse-drawn cab was retired from city streets in 1922.

As the city expanded there was less and less space available for horses and the area was needed for other purposes. Carl Chope ran the Waukegan Riding Stables until his death in 1959. Today that property is the site of the Golf Road fire station.

Now agriculture is just a memory for Waukegan, but not so for horses. The police department acquired Freedom and Liberty to help with crowd control. They were later joined by Justice. All three help keep alive part of our past.
