I am delighted to report that our annual Tour of Homes was a huge success. Over 350 people attended the tour, and even Mother Nature cooperated with beautiful weather. The three private homes, the Presbyterian Church and the Haines Museum all looked wonderful and were enjoyed by all. It is interesting to note that almost 50% of our visitors were from outside Waukegan, representing twenty-eight communities and several states! I would personally like to thank everyone who helped make the tour such a success, from the members of our hard-working tour committee, to our room watchers, members of the Presbyterian Church, and most of all to our homeowners for sharing their lovely homes with us. It really is a great opportunity to showcase the best Waukegan has to offer. We are always looking for homes for future tours, if you know of anyone who may be interested, please let us know.

A great deal of work was completed in and around the museum for the tour. The Park District paid for carpeting, which was installed in the dining room and second floor workroom. In addition, park employees did a masterful job repairing and repainting the shed located immediately east of the Haines. The generous bequest from the Palo family allowed us to furnish the dining room, and items loaned from Harry Came allowed the table to be set with wonderful period china and crystal. Our next meeting and program will be held on Sunday September 19, 2004 at 2:00pm in Lilac Cottage. Wayne Munn will be sharing information and images of 119 N. Genesee St., the building which contains a 2nd floor sealed off in the late 1930s and just recently rediscovered. It is a virtual time capsule of life in the years prior to World War II, and the program should be fascinating. See the notice on page 2 for further details.

As school starts up again for the year, we will be turning our attention to the great materials prepared last year for the schools, which assist in teaching local history. Our museum supervisor Brian Hora and new board member Gretta Dieck will be working closely with the schools to make sure these materials are being used, and to encourage teachers to bring their classes to the museum.

Sheridan Road, Waukegan, IL.** Bus transportation will be provided from Bowen Heritage Circle due to parking restrictions near Oakwood Cemetery. The first bus is scheduled to leave the Bowen Heritage Circle at 12:30pm with the last bus departing for the cemetery at approximately 3:30pm.

The Haines Museum will also be open from noon to 3:00pm during this event allowing visitors to glimpse Victorian life through period parlors, dining room, kitchen, and bedrooms.

"Time Capsule Apartment"

Imagine a real-life Hardy Boys, Nancy Drew adventure about a Waukegan building with a 65-year-old mystery. On Sunday September 19 at 2 PM join Wayne Munn for a journey into the "Time Capsule Apartment" closed-up in 1939 and rediscovered last autumn above 119 N. Genesee. You may have read Ralph Zahorik's "Time Capsule Apartment" columns in the News-Sun. Even more of the mystery has been uncovered since then. Wayne will take you through the Time Capsule using the magic of digital pictures. Beginning in the spring of 2004, by special arrangement with building owner Paul Frischer, Wayne spent several days documenting this 4,500 square foot second floor with still pictures and video. The only access to the space was up an extension ladder through a hole in the tin ceiling. Head Librarian Beverly Millard and Wayne also spent many hours researching this mystery in the Waukegan Historical Society's John Raymond Memorial Library. You'll get an up-close and personal tour and see some of the artifacts found in this once-again accessible space. You'll also learn interesting details about the building and the family that owned it. Both the documenting of the space and the research are on-going, so you may even be able to provide additional clues and leads.

NEWPORT TOWNSHIP OPENS HOUSE MUSEUM

The Newport Township Historical Society held a grand opening for their house museum over the weekend of July 31 - August 1. Located at 15155 Wadsworth Road in Wadsworth, the 1902 frame home was willed to the Society by Grace Shields, a charter member of the Society who lived her entire life in the house and died at the age of 91 in 2002. There are currently six furnished rooms in the house including the kitchen, dining room, sitting room and three bedrooms, all of which feature original furnishings from the Shields family. The parlor has been transformed into a space where items regarding the history of Newport Township will be displayed. The Society plans to have the museum open on Saturdays. Elections

Two significant events occurred in Waukegan's recent past in close proximity to each other. Running under the Republican banner, two women were the first of their gender to be elected to their respective offices.

Ann Christensen became the first woman on Waukegan's City Council in 1957. She had worked at Abbott and in her husband's business when she became interested in elective office. When she ran in the 5th Ward promary she defeated four men. In the general election she garnered 64% of the vote. Her ticket was headed by Harry Kilbane in the mayoral race, but he lost to Robert Sabonjian for his first term.

Ms. Christensen faced some opposition by other members of the City Council who were not accustomed to having a woman seated among them. Nonetheless she worked on the council, served on various committees and chaired the Street Lighting Committee at one time.

In her re-election primary she easily defeated former mayor Joseph Keber and went on to repeat her 64% victory in the general election. She retired from the council in 1965.

During her campaign she said she hoped her efforts might "open the door for other civic-minded women". Perhaps she was some inspiration in 1960 when Stephanie Sulthin became the first woman elected to a county office.

Stephanie Pucin Sulthin was born and raised in the Waukegan/North Chicago area. She joined the office of the Clerk of the Circuit Court in 1933 and was made deputy clerk in 1944. Following the resignation of L.J. Wilmot, Ms. Sulthin was appointed clerk in January, 1960. Campaigning for the position in her own right, she was elected in November of that year with 57% of the vote.

She faced no primary opposition in her successful re-election runs of 1964 and 1968. She announced her retirement, but changed her mind and ran again in 1972. In that election she was the top vote getter of all candidates in Lake County.

She was a member of many civic and social organizations, including serving as president of the Illinois Association of Court Clerks. She served as a delegate to the 1976 Republican National Convention. She retired that year and passed away in 1983.

PALO GIFT BENEFITS MUSEUM AND LIBRARY

Last year, the Society was the recipient of a very generous gift of \$5,000 from the family of the late Ed and Eevi Palo, long-time supporters of the Society. This bequest was a wonderful opportunity for the Society to undertake two projects. The first was the replacement of the old outdated photocopier at the library. The new machine is not only much faster and efficient, but it allows for more sizes of copies to be made. The copier receives heavy usage from the constant stream of researchers using the facility.



The gift also allowed for the furnishing of the dining room, a project we have long desired. A beautiful Renaissance Revival dining table was purchased, which was then refinished and outfitted with new leaves. Randy Bowcott donated four coordinating chairs, and Harry Came donated two additional chairs, which had originally belonged to Jack Stewart. These chairs were then refinished and reupholstered in dark green velvet. In conjunction with the new carpeting in the room, and the sideboard installed in 2002, the room is really looking wonderful.

The Board is extremely grateful to the Palo family for remembering the Society and we are glad that their gift could be used for two such worthwhile projects.
